

WILLIAM MAYHEW EX-POLICEMAN

His Death Occurred Last Evening at the Home of Brother Between Hamilton and War-

WELL KNOWN IN KEOKUK

Spent the Great Number of His Years in This City and Was a Police-

Last evening at 10:30 o'clock at the residence of his brother, J. Wesley Mayhew between Warsaw and Hamilton, occurred the death of William Mayhew, an ex-policeman and former resident of Keokuk who is probably known by almost all of the old time citizens.

The greater part of Mr. Mayhew's life was spent in Keokuk and during his many years of residence here he became well known and made many friends. He is especially well remembered by many of the older citizens and those who held public offices as for eight years he was a member of the Keokuk police force.

Born in Cincinnati.

William Mayhew was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, sixty-seven years ago, and came to Keokuk in the year 1851. The greater part of his life since that time had been spent in Keokuk and it was in this city that he became well known.

He is survived by two brothers, J. Wesley and Benjamin, and one sister, Mrs. Lincoln De Huff.

The body was brought to this city last evening and taken to the undertaking parlors of E. E. Hawkes where it will remain until the funeral.

William Mayhew was a policeman under Jack Hardin between the years 1875 and 1883. This morning Mr. Hardin spoke of him as being a good officer, straight forward and reliable, and one who was always faithful in the discharge of his duty.
