

THE WEATHER OF NOVEMBER

Past Month Was the Wettest November Around Here for a Number of Years.

Observer Gosewisch has issued his monthly weather summary for November which shows that the month just past was one of the wettest Novembers for several years, the total rainfall being 3.95. The average for the month is 1.91 and this year was exceeded but four times since 1871. In 1896 the rainfall was 10.1.

There were six days of rain and three thunderstorms, fourteen clear days, nine cloudy days and seven partly cloudy days. The mean temperature was 45, which is warm, for the average is but 39.7.
