

### SERMON WAS VERY IMPRESSIVE

Was the One Delivered Last Evening by Rev. Orr at the United Presbyterian Church.

### THE PRECIOUS SOUL

The Lost in Hell Are Concerned About People on Earth More Than Some Church People Are.

"Your soul is too precious for God to let go, to let slip through His fingers easily." The sermon of Dr. Orr was particularly impressive last night and the interest was intense as was attested by the quiet attention of his audience. The speaker based his talk on the 16th chapter of Luke. "The lost in hell are more concerned about the salvation of people in this world than a great many church people are," said Dr. Orr. This is the first day of December, just one month more of 1908; she is just pruning her wings to take her flight into eternity—are you going to come to the end of this year without a single soul? There will be no man in hell whom God could save without doing violence to that man's will power God has done, God is doing and God will do everything that he can do to get men to turn away from sin, but if they will not quit sin, there is no power in the Divine arm (I say it in all reverence) to save the man who will not quit sin; who will not receive Jesus Christ. If you will give up sin and accept Christ, you are saved that minute; if you do not receive Him, you are lost. God gave you the bible and on every page of it, from Genesis to Revelation there are warnings, invitations, exhortations, rebukes, reproofs and examples, through which and in which He pleads with men to get them to give up sin, showing them the consequences of sin on the one hand, and showing them the results of a life free from sin, on the other hand, and by this book He has been pleading with men and is pleading with men. If God wanted to put you in hell, why did He give you that book? Again God gave you your conscience to keep you out of hell. Conscience is the representative of God in your soul. If you go to hell, you will be lower down than any devil there, the devils had no bible, no warnings.

Keep Out of Hell. God sends you sermons to keep you out of hell. "I have preached twenty-eight times in this town," said Dr. Orr. "I have put my very life blood in it; I have pointed you to the Lamb of God in every sermon and in spite of all the sermons you have turned your back upon God, hugging your sin to your bosom like a skeleton. Again, God has punctuated your life every week with the Sabbath day. A quiet hush falls upon this town, the bells ring out, everything becomes quiet. It is God pointing you to a higher, sweeter, grander life, asking you to give up your sin and turn away from it. God pleads with you in the Sabbath with its sweet memories, its chime of bells, its quiet holiness. Then there is the Wednesday night prayer meeting. What have you done with these? God has put them there, it is God's pleading, God's effort to save

Tonight the campaign closes and there are many who will leave the church and go on their way rejoicing, for there have been sown in their hearts the seeds of a better life; there are others who will leave the church with a vague impression of some door awaiting their entrance, some noble summons, some chance of escape to a higher life, for they have turned a deaf ear to the pleadings of the man who has labored so patiently and lovingly to save them—they too will go on their way. Who shall tell whither? Dr. Orr has worked faithfully and well and through his efforts the spirit of hatred has been crowded out of many hearts and in its place is left the sweet fragrance of love and forgiveness. On this, the closing night of this campaign, the Master surely looks down on Him in loving benediction; "Well done, good and faithful servant"—and so we bid him God-speed.

### AN EVENING IN AN AUTOMOBILE

Westminster Brotherhood Members All Take a Ride Last Evening in One Machine.

### THEY ENJOYED A SUPPER

The Program Consisted of a Number of Addresses About the Festive Gasoline Wagon.

The regular meeting of the Westminster Brotherhood was held at the chapel last evening as had been arranged by the committee in charge. Before the banquet in the spacious dining room a short business session was held in the chapel. Seven men were unanimously voted in as members which makes the roll larger than at any previous time. Reports were made by the treasurer and pastor.

After adjournment all were invited to the dining room and enjoyed the spread that was prepared and so graciously served by young ladies of the Y. P. S. C. E. society.

Mr. W. J. Fulton chairman of the membership committee of the brotherhood acted as toastmaster and very fittingly introduced each speaker on the program.

Latham H. Ayer, Jr.

Mr. Ayer's subject was from the salesman's view point and dealt largely with the entrance of the auto into business, professional and social life. He said the easiest way to speak on his subject would be to sell a machine. A description was given of the many antics a machine is able to perform and just when we least expect an accident. Mr. Ayer used a good many technical phrases so few knew what he was talking about this kept all present on the eve of expectancy. He confessed that the average buyer knew very little about the price of an auto and that the looks of a machine first, then speed determines the sale. The item of expense both industrial and that of maintenance were touched upon and he said that the salesman in this community cut more of a figure after the purchase had been made as it was quite necessary to know how to demonstrate the use and care of the machine. In concluding Mr. Ayer said that the auto as a practical proposition was just being developed. Speed seemed to be the first requisite but practical service especially for the business man and for commercial use have greatly come to the front in the last year or so.

Dr. C. R. Armentrout.

Dr. Armentrout, who uses an auto about as strenuously as any man in Keokuk, was introduced as the person who had been next to one and was therefore requested to give some of his experiences. The auto alphabet is a code known only to masters of the buzz wazon and this feature and accomplishment was a special vocabulary for the exclusive use of masters of automobiles.

The doctor was very explicit as to this matter as it formed the basis of his address. Not only must a man be

possessed of a language all his own, for emergency but he must be an expert electrician, a plumber and a gas-fitter, a shoemaker and maker of rubber goods, an engine wiper and jack-of-all-trades. He spoke of the advantages of the auto over the horse especially from a physician's standpoint, for long endurance trips, both for making professional calls and for ordinary seasons of waiting for help in cases of break-downs twelve miles from home. He touched upon the expense compared to equine locomotion and very happily classed himself as an auto salesman. He sold the first machine he had to a man who confessed it was his first purchase and probably his last as the thing was a Chinese go-cart, only having one lung. The necessity of good care and attention were given as very important items in maintaining a machine and the fact that they were always ready was a great argument in their favor. Dr. Armentrout gave a number of amusing experiences which seemed otherwise at the exact hour of their occurrence.

Dr. A. B. Hughes.

"The 'horseless age' or 'whiny or chug'" was the topic which the next speaker was assigned and Dr. Hughes commenced by saying that he knew nothing about an auto and hated a horse. It is a well-known fact that the doctor used to drive the ugliest horse in town and it is understood the animal is now on exhibition at the stock show in Chicago.

He said he preferred to go about as nature intended that he should but circumstances well known prevented. The auto side of his subject was treated first and the horse he believed would never be discarded. Three classes were entitled to own automobiles—the born mechanic, the educated mechanic and the millionaire.

The above reasons were sufficient vouchers for his not owning one so he said but the hope was expressed that some day he might own one just for the experience of the thing.

Dr. E. B. Newcomb.

On account of the inability of two speakers to be present Dr. Newcomb was called upon for impromptu remarks and thought that the last speaker had about expressed the sentiment of the evening in that all present would like to own an automobile if they could. He spoke of the advantages and disadvantages of owning one and carried off the honors of the evening with his amusing stories illustrating the predicaments of the autoist and that "a man can't fix one of the things and be a good member" after the darkey's experience.

This completed the program of the evening and with a few announcements by Mr. Fulton concerning the brotherhood bible class which is held each Sunday morning at 9:45 the pleasures of the evening were brought to a close.
