SHAW CREDITED WITH A RUMOR

STREET CARS ON MONDAY EVENING

Work of Assembling the New Engine Has Advanced Far Enough to Make This Pleasing Prediction.

ARC LIGHTS WEDNESDAY

Electric Light Company is About Recovered From the Accident of the Evening of October 19.

When the full moon Monday night beams down on Keokuk, the man in the moon will see the street cars running again at night. On Tuesday night he will see the Keokuk Lantern Club go out of existence and on Wednesday night he will see the twinkle of the arc lights in Keokuk.

This is the present schedule for the man in the moon, for the work at the electric light plant has progressed so steadily that it is announced that in all probabilities that the night street car service can be resumed on next Monday night and that the arc lights will be ready for business on Wednesday night.

The new engine, bought at Norfolk is being assembled at the plant as rapidly as possible and the work is now so far along that it is believed that the new engine can be started next Monday and that the evening street car service can be resumed.

There will be no call for the arc lights on that evening on account of the moon being on duty but by Wednesday evening, the schedule will call for the arc lights and they will be turned on. Should Monday evening be cloudy the lights may be turned on.

Since October 19. There have been no arc lights or evening street cars since the evening of October 19, for that was the date when the giant fly wheel at the plant burst and wrecked the plant.

Since the day following the accident the street cars in the city and the interurban cars have been compelled to cease running at 5 o'clock in the evening.

The streets were in darkness on account of there being no arc lights and the only light was that furnished by the moon the stars and the Keokuk Lantern Club. Considerable inconvenience was caused to the public by the accident, for the street cars at night were never missed so much as when they were not running. The interurban line was a great convenience during the evening and that was greatly missed by the people, while the absence of arc lights at night proved a great inconvenience to everyone who had to be out after dark.
