turned out and husked his corn crop. Mr. Patterson was severely injured in a runaway accident several months ago, caused by an automobile, and is only able to get about in an invalid's chair.

The large barn on the farm of Mrs. S. Gullickson, two and one-half miles northeast of Northwood, burned to the ground, together with an adjacent granary, the two buildings containing 400 or 500 bushels of oats, several tons of hay, harness, implements, and two calves.

George Karcher, a hostler in the Illinois Central railroad yards at Fort Dodge, suffered painful injuries from being knocked down by an engine, and as a result will be confined to the hospital for several weeks. Karcher is a man of about 40 years of age, and is employed as a hostler in the Illinois Central yards.

David Lynch of Newcastle, Neb., sued the Sioux City Tribune for \$10,000 for alleged libel in an article which was printed some time ago, and which stated that Nebraska health officers were pursuing Lynch because he had violated the quarantine law. The jury in the case returned a verdict in favor of the newspaper.

Frank Starnes of Laurel believes he is the champion corn husker of at least Marshall county, if not the entire state. Starnes husked as high as 120 bushels of corn in a single day of nine hours, and for twenty-four and one-half days, husked and cribbed on an average of 107 1/2 bushels a day, never working more than nine hours.

Other prize winners were John Bixler, C. C. Norton, C. H. Lind, Laverne Smith and William Perryman. The school children had many exhibits.
