NOBODY CARES TO LISTEN

Spectators' Bench is Empty at the District Court During Paddieford Case.

In the district court today the damage case of H. A. Paddieford vs. the City of Fort Madison is going on, a jury hearing the evidence in the case which is one for damages brought by Paddieford against the city for an overflow in Dry creek, which flooded his property.

The case is not exciting enough for the spectators and this morning during the most important testimony in the matter, there was but one man sitting on the benches listening to the case. When the Ritchie brothers were being tried for assault with intent to kill, there was always a full house, but when a man sues a city, there is no interest from the public.

M. E. Bannon was on the witness stand this morning and acted in a triple capacity. When he first came to Fort Madison, the first work he had was the building of a house for Paddieford on the property, near Dry creek, and he told of the conditions in that vicinity twenty years ago when the house was first built.

Afterwards he became city engineer of Fort Madison and during his term of office, the flood came and Paddieford filed his claim against the city. Bannon accompanied the city council to the scene a couple of times to examine the conditions and drew up plans for changing the course of the creek. He also testified as an expert witness on flood conditions, wing dams, etc.

LATEST LETTER FROM FRANK BELT

Says He is Doing Everything Possible Towards Getting Together a Good Baseball Club.

EGAN SUPPORTS CLINTON

Evidence of This According to the Hawk-Eye is Shown in Letter From Egan to Hough.

Frank Belt, manager of the Keokuk team, in his latest letter writes: "I am doing everything I can towards getting together a good club for Keokuk next season. I have signed two catchers, H. S. Wilson of a Nebraska club, and Shafer of Evansville, Ind., and am after two other good ones. Have five new men for the outfield and three new pitchers. I am enjoying the best of health and expect to be in Keokuk to attend the league meeting, at which time I will be able to give the line-up of the team."

Rex Wind, sporting editor for the Courier-Post of Hannibal is doing all in his power to assist the club of that place to a berth in the Central association. The Gate City received from him a manuscript boosting Hannibal for the vacancy. At the end of the following article is given figures showing attendance and records of the Hannibal club last season.

"This tranquility in purpose never did get at the gist of success and those who go at a proposition with as about as much noise as a library sign never will get to the end of the rainbow. Therefore may these loud talking figures and panoplied statements land upon the ears of the Central association managers with a little more halo than a hand full of cotton dropping on a load of hay. The main essential to this "big noise" is the fact that Hannibal wants in the Central association.

"Hannibal's bid for a berth in the Central, which will be decided on December 15th, is not based on any poetical, sentimental, alluring proposition but upon the figures of last season, which was a success from the word go. A comparison is made briefly, not with a puerile picking of flaws idea, or with any thought of lambasting the eternal tar out of our opponents, but before the decision is made it is no more than fair to the Central that they know what they are getting, and here is Hannibal in a nutshell."

Burlington Hawk-Eye: There are several things that make it appear that Mr. Egan is planning larger ventures for the coming season rather than drawing out of the Burlington field, and if the inferences are correct, it will not be a bad thing for Burlington. The reader will remember that several days ago the Hawk-Eye published a statement to the effect that the base ball people of Clinton had suddenly become aggressive in their efforts to gain a place in the Central association circuit. In that article it was stated that a man whose identity could not be disclosed had taken up the cause of Clinton. The Hawk-Eye was not in possession of his name, but it was able to state that he was one of the best known base ball managers in the west. It was stated that this man had received the assurance of strong financial backing and would push Clinton into the Central circuit if possible.

Now comes the information to the Hawk-Eye that Manager Egan is warmly supporting Clinton's efforts to secure Oskaloosa's place. Evidence of this is contained in a letter which Mr. Egan wrote Manager Hough of the Hannibal team, replying to an inquiry as to Mr. Egan's attitude toward Hannibal. Mr. Egan frankly told Mr. Hough that he would not support Hannibal, and that if Hannibal had to stay in the Illinois-Missouri league, and it and the other I-M. cities wanted Galesburg to stay with them, he would cast his vote next Tuesday for Clinton.

In addition to this reports are received from Kewanee that Manager Egan visited that city, and conferred with the base ball leaders there concerning supporting Clinton's efforts to gain admission to the Central circuit. While Manager Egan has made no statement on the subject, it is suggested that having looked over the ground he considers Clinton a good field and is considering the question of putting

in a team there and either managing it himself or placing it under the management of a competent man. This latter, it is suggested, may be the mysterious well-known base ball man who is now credited with being back of Clinton. Locally it has been stated that Egan has offered to turn his interests here over to an experienced man, who will amply manage and direct the base ball interest of Burlington.

The conclusion in the minds of thinking fans—without any suggestion whatever from Mr. Egan—is that Mr. Egan is merely figuring on a double ownership in the Central circuit, with some other capable man as a lieutenant. This man, it is presumed, is the "unknown," to whom Mr. Egan will entrust the Burlington enterprise, while he takes up the personal management of Clinton, or in whose charge he will place Clinton while he remains in personal charge of Burlington.

There may be absolutely nothing in these rumors and conclusions, but in the opinion of some it would not be a bad arrangement for Mr. Egan, who is amply capable of overseeing the base ball affairs of two cities. Few, if any, people believe that Mr. Egan will turn Burlington down. With some three thousand dollars' worth of property here in base ball park, fixtures and buildings, it would be a poor business deal. On the other hand, Burlington recognizes the fact that in order to have first class base ball it must give Mr. Egan adequate financial support.

Decision as to what Burlington may expect will be made, no doubt, shortly subsequent to the special meeting of the league, to be held next Tuesday in Keokuk. On that occasion, Oskaloosa's successor will be chosen and the personnel of the circuit towns fixed.
