Last evening after losing the first and second games of a series of three they completely backed down, and resorted to such antics as to cause the derision of the audience assembled. Imagine a team composed of the first class bowlers of the city giving the game completely up after being a few pins in the rear, and not content with that sloughing the game in an imitation of their opponents. The Drexel bowlers would assume a position at the head of the runway worthy of the attention of the best cartoonist in the country, and would deliver the ball in the gutter or any other place that suited their pleasure. The result was that the following scores were made: 94, 94, 70 and 70.

According to President Wolf this morning such action does not behoove any member of the Keokuk Bowling Association and if any repetition of the affair occurs, the team will probably be ousted from the league. The action of the Drexel team thus far has been anything but from deserving of criticism.

Russian Wore All of His Wardrobe and is Alive Today as a Result.

SIoux CITY, Dec. 22.—To his habit of wearing more shirts and coats than the ordinary man, Benadektas Cesunas, a Russian, who works in one of the packing houses, is thankful for his life.

While on his way home from the packing house, where he had drawn his week's pay, he was stopped at Fourth and Chambers streets by two men who stopped from the shadow of a tree and leveled a revolver at him. Cesunas does not understand English and did not catch the drift of the strangers' remarks, but he knew the meaning of the revolver and immediately started to run, drawing a bullet from the highwaymen. Cesunas knew that he was hit and feared he was mortally wounded. He managed to reach his home, where a call was sent to the police.

It was found the bullet had struck him under the arm but had merely pierced the skin. Captain Newell discovered that Cesunas had been saved from serious injury because he had been wearing four shirts and two coats. The bullet was found clinging to a thread of one of the shirts.

THE DEATH OF B. M. PETERSON

Death Followed a Stroke of Paralysis at the Ripe Old Age of 82 Years—A Member of Swedish Church.

WAS BORN IN SWEDEN

And Came to This Country in the Year 1869—Has Lived in Keokuk For Nearly Forty Years.

This morning at 12:40 o'clock at the family residence, 1413 Fulton street, occurred the death of Bengt M. Peterson an old time resident of the city. Although quite advanced in years the death of Mr. Peterson came quite suddenly. Sunday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock he was taken down with a stroke of paralysis and he sank steadily until early this morning, when death came.

Mr. Peterson was always a very healthy and robust man and was quite strong, even during the recent years of his life. He was a hard worker and his muscles had grown very firm, and had not this stroke of paralysis come as it did the life of Mr. Peterson would probably have been prolonged for years to come.

Born in Sweden.

Bengt M. Peterson was born in Sweden in the year 1825, and on the first day of September. In the year 1869 he came to this country and after a short residence in Des Moines came to Keokuk. With his wife, to whom he was married shortly before leaving Sweden, he had made Keokuk his home ever since and made many friends here.

Mr. Peterson was a member of the Swedish Mission church.

The surviving relatives are the following: Maria C., children, Mrs. C. G. Nelson, Bengt A., and Bernard, and eleven grandchildren.

BRILLIANT METER FALLS IN KANSAS

Hundreds of People Saw the Heavenly Spectacle on Sunday Evening in Western Sky.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Dec. 22.—The strangest meteor ever seen in this part of the country was witnessed falling by several hundred people last evening between 5 and 6 o'clock. It appeared to drop somewhere in Kansas, west of here.

The meteor itself seemed to be a ball of about the size of a street lamp, its tail or stream of sparks was several feet in length. It was visible about thirty seconds.

A peculiar white streak, and what is regarded as a phenomenon, which the meteor seemed to leave behind it as a path, was visible for fifteen minutes. It then seemed to waver as blown by the wind and fade from sight.
