A MEMORIAL FOR SENATOR ALLISON

Dubuque Citizens Will Organize an Incorporated Company to Take Charge of the Matter.

The Dubuque Journal says: Plans are rapidly nearing completion for the incorporation of the Allison Memorial association, an organization of the business men of the city for the purpose of taking charge of the collection of funds and the erection of a monument in this city, to the late Senator Allison. Several prominent men of the city have been quietly sounding the sentiment of business men for the past few days and have found that they are anxious that steps be at once taken for the formation of a society to take charge of the work.

Several well known business men have already consented to act as directors in the new corporation and it is expected that the articles of incorporation will be drafted during the week and filed not later than next Saturday. It is known that other movements are on in the state to secure the monument at the state or national capital. It is believed that initial action in this matter should be taken by Dubuque business men and for this reason, those promoting the scheme for an incorporation of the Allison Memorial association are hurrying the work as fast as possible.

As soon as the articles of incorpora-

tion are drawn and filed the work of selecting the site, collecting the funds, getting the design and in fact every detail connected with the erection of a memorial to the late senator, will be taken up by the association. The most important work at present is to get representative business men in the association, and it is expected that the canvass will be completed within a short time.


