WATERLOO MAY SELL FRANCHISE. This is the Latest Dope Sent Out by the Burlington Hawk-Eye in Yesterday's Issue.

THE PRESIDENT SAYS NO. Franchise Has Not Been Sold, Although the Rumor May Have Good Grounds to Stand on.

A short time previous to the recent meeting of the Central association The Gate City contained an article proposing the admittance of Galesburg and Hannibal into the league and the dropping of Waterloo to make the vacancy. But this proposition seemed too strong for the staid directors of the Central association, and while many would have liked to have seen the suggestion carried out at the meeting one would venture to start the ball. Now comes a rumor that Galesburg is going to purchase the franchise from Waterloo, for the latter town is of the opinion that it will be dropped next year. President M. E. Justice, in an interview, said that he had heard nothing of the proposed sale of the franchise and that before it could occur, the president's sanction and the sanction of the board of directors of the league were necessary. from Galesburg, is to the effect that the Galesburg association had purchased Waterloo's franchise and would be a member of the Central association next year after all. The purchase price was given as being \$2,000, but what grounds there are for the statement is not definitely known here, further than such a course had been advised for various reasons and was thought to be very likely of consummation at the January meeting at Keokuk.

The second of the reasons is the persistent rumor that the old Iowa league would be reorganized with the large cities in Waterloo's end of Iowa as the leading factors in such an organization and if ousted from the league next year, Waterloo would be out of a berth with nothing for its franchise. If it disposes of it at this time it can realize enough on it to be one of the "big ones" in the new organization and will be in a position to take a leading position in one of the most compact leagues ever in existence.
