election, casting his vote for Lincoln. Beans were used for ballots, blacks for Lincoln, and white for McClellan.

Henry R. Miller voted for him in 1860 and in 1864. But on account of ill health was not accepted as a volunteer.

A. J. Mathias, 38th Iowa, voted for him in 1864, at Donaldsonville, Louisiana.

Mr. O'Brien voted for him in 1864. John Rickert, Hamilton, Ill., voted for him in 1864.

John S. Sims cast his vote for him both times, and for every republican president since.

Mr. Sheppard, like Capt. Evans, was debarred from voting.

J. N. Whetstone voted for him in 1864.

Dr. Shaffer voted for him in 1864 and his letter telling how he was deprived of the pleasure in 1860 is an interesting one. It is given in full as follows:

From Dr. Shaffer. I played the air at head of companies of Wide Awakes "many a time and oft" in the 1860 campaign. I was ill and was ordered to Pennsylvania, so had no opportunity to vote.

I voted for Lincoln in 1864. I voted for John C. Fremont in 1856. We have a healthy organization in this First congressional district. Over 400 are enrolled. Our second meeting was at Fairfield last September. Over seventy attended, the youngest 74 years; most of them above 80 and four (I think) above 90 years.

Our next meeting will be at Mount Pleasant September 7, 1909. Joseph A. Keck of Stockport is president and I am secretary.

I am heartily glad you have begun this movement. Our Fremont Voters' Association has submitted to a committee who will report next September an amendment to the constitution admitting all Lincoln voters to membership.

Hope your enrollment will be big but in order to make it so conspicuous that it will be valuable, you and your co-workers must use lots of printers' ink and plenty of postage stamps. Keep it before the people. I will speak to as many of the Fremont boys as I may see to send in their names."
