Four days more of the big shoe sale at Bode-Larson's. Hear the Sylvia Musical Trio, at the grand tomorrow night. T. F. McGrath has been troubled with rheumatism during the past few weeks. Some laughable surprises at the Roll-a-Way Thursday night. Do not miss this merry masquerade party or you will regret it. Yesterday the men in the ice field cut 161 cars of ice. At the present rate at which the men are harvesting ice enough will soon be had and the harvest will be ended. A bridge gang will arrive in the city today and commence loading cars to fill the Rock Island ice house near the round house. The house has a capacity of 180 tons of ice. Cedar Rapids Gazette: W. H. McCoy, the veteran city directory man, this morning put a force of men at work in canvassing Cedar Rapids for the ninth edition of The Gazette's free city directory, which will be issued at an early date. Before the Iowa State Railroad Commission L. S. Cass of St. Paul, second vice president of the Chicago Great Western, announced that the road would be reorganized shortly, and that Horace G. Burt would be president.

Earl Hemenover who has been ill at his home for some time is able to be up and around. The Waterloo Courier, one of the best papers in the state was fifty years old yesterday and celebrated with a golden anniversary number. A number of the larger cities of the country and smaller are today celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Edgar Allan Poe, the poet. A meeting of the Trinity M. E. Brotherhood will be held this evening at the close of the revival meeting for the purpose of electing delegates to the Federation Council, which meets in a short time. There will be a meeting tomorrow evening of the Colored Young Men's Christian club at Masonic hall, to which all are invited to attend. The meeting is called by F. S. Johnson, president and C. C. Johnson, secretary of the club. Next Saturday the first chapters of the serial story, "The Redfields," by Lillian W. Hale, will appear in this paper. It is a short but interesting serial story. Be sure and get the opening chapters. You will want to read the complete story. A man from Canton, who was visiting in the city last evening, fell at the foot of Johnson street and broke his leg. He was placed on a cot and taken home in the baggage car. A couple of friends were with him and looked after his needs. One of the longest Wabash trains that has left Keokuk in some time pulled out this morning at 8:30 for the east. Seventeen box cars and ten coal cars made up the train. Much business is now being done by this short line and business on the various roads shows a gratifying increase. It is likely that a special two cent stamp bearing the face of Lincoln will be issued and on sale on February 12, the birthday of the immortal Lincoln. A suit has been filed in the District court by the Overtein-Klein Co. vs. Thos. W. Daw asking for the foreclosure on a mortgage on lot 9 and parts of lots 8 and 6 in block 51, given to secure a note for \$2,000, which is alleged to be unpaid. A receiver is asked for to collect the rents from the property. Judgment is asked for \$2,000 on the note and for interest and costs. Physical Director R. E. Chamberlin has as yet received no replies from Quincy to his letters asking for basketball games. The letters were sent more than a month ago and Keokuk players are beginning to feel that the Quincy aggregations fear them. Keokuk's basketball record during the past two years has traveled broadcast and local managers are having difficulty in obtaining games. Something new in the way of shipment of fish from the Illinois river is reported. A consignment from Pekin to New York embracing 10,000 pounds will be shipped in a tank car belonging to one of the express companies. The fish will be shipped alive and will be supplied with oxygen forced into the water of the tank through charcoal by a gasoline engine. The experiment has been tried and worked successfully but this is the first large shipment that has been made. All of the members of the I-M league are now busy at work getting together clubs with which to open the season. Beardstown is trying to purchase the Havana club entire, but it is very doubtful if this will be done. The Havana management can get a pretty good price for the club, selling it out individually—more than any one town can pay, as ball players are too plentiful to pay a high price for them in a small league. Pekin would like to have some of them, but they have a contract about signed with a manager, so they are not particular about getting the entire bunch either.

There were the usual number of coasters on the hills of Keokuk last evening and Eleventh and High streets were crowded with people enjoying this sport. A number of sleighing parties were also given. Last Friday evening a surprise party was given in honor of Howard Montague at his home No. 923 High street. The guests enjoyed music and games and at a late hour refreshments were served, the guests departing after having had a splendid time. Coasting was frezied yesterday afternoon and evening on South Eleventh street, the hill being crowded with young folks who were having a great time. A dozen or more big bob sleds were in the running and the sport was exhilarating and thrilling. This morning Officer Holliday went down on Fourth street and arrested Nellie Greer and Frank Arnold and a charge of starting a rough house with the other occupants of a little frame house near the Scott factory. The Grand Leaders are making a great bid for the championship and during the last month have appeared even stronger than the Keokuk Club team. The Seal Skin manager has signed Patrick Welsh, whose average of 180 for four games last evening, will place him in the lineup tonight. The Grand Leaders will be strengthened by Baur, formerly of the St. Mary's but it is not yet known whom he will supplant.
