IGINS SUIT TO SET ASIDE WILL

Bruce Holmes, Heir of Mrs. Lydia Bradley, Says Mrs. Bradley Was Unduly Influenced.

PEORIA, Ill., Feb. 4.—Bruce Holmes, the collateral heir of the late Mrs. Lydia Bradley, the founder of the Bradley Polytechnic Institute, today filed suit in the circuit court asking to have the will set aside on the grounds that when it was made, Mrs. Bradley was "under duress" and was the subject of "undue influence."

BURNED TO DEATH WHILE IN CHAINS

Violent Patient Cremated in Vacant House, While Made Helpless by Shackles.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 4.—Clifton Smith, chained in a vacant house on the outskirts of the city of Cotton Court, was burned to death when fire destroyed the building today. Smith's mind was affected by an attack of small pox. The authorities chained him in the vacant house when he grew violent. It was impossible to care for him at the detention hospital.

POTTER'S FIELD FOR JOHNSON

Unless the Prize Fighting Brother Sends Enough Money to Meet the Funeral Expenses.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—Roscoe Johnson, a brother of Jack Johnson, the heavyweight champion of the world, will probably be buried in the potter's field unless the champion sends enough

money here to properly bury him. Roscoe was a waiter in a restaurant when he was found ill and practically penniless and was taken to a hospital where he died with pneumonia.

PASSED BILL OVER GOVERNOR'S VETO

No More Liquor to be Manufactured in State of Tennessee, After January 1, 1910.

NASHVILLE, Tennessee, Feb. 4.—The house this afternoon passed over the governor's veto by 59 to 27, the bill prohibiting the manufacture of liquor in the state of Tennessee. The law will take effect January 1, 1910, having already passed the senate.

CHARGED WITH REVOLUTION

Man Arrested in Moscow on a Charge of Being Associated With Revolutionists.

MOSCOW, Feb. 4.—A man giving the name of Richard P. Stevens, Washington, D. C., is under arrest here, charged with associating with the revolutionists. The man's passport bears the foregoing name, which he says he obtained from his father, Theo. Stevens.



NOTHING DOING IN BEEF TRUST CASE

District Attorney Sims and Attorney Wilkeson Compelled to Report Failure of Evidence.

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—United States District Attorney Sims and Special United States Prosecutor Wilkeson left this afternoon for Washington to report to the attorney general regarding the progress of the investigation of the alleged beef trust. They will report the investigation failed almost completely.

Excitement in the Duma.

Elevator Falls, Killing Two.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Feb. 4.—Michael Mudderick, aged fifty-eight, and Chas. Berger, aged twenty-six, were killed today when an elevator in which they and eight other men were descending a shaft in the Jerome coal mine, at Jerome, fell to the bottom of the shaft. The others were injured.

Freight Rates Have Increased.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Freight rates have been increased on all classes and in all directions since the enactment of the Hepburn rate regulation law, according to reports filed in congress today by the interstate commerce commission.

Train Strikes Track Laborers.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—A New York Central train coming into the city this afternoon ran into a gang of track laborers at the high bridge. Six are reported being killed.

TAMPA, Fla., Feb. 4.—W. J. Bryan delivered an address at the state fair here today. He has been traveling across the south where he has made many speeches from the rear end of the train to the crowds that had gathered.

Carrie Nation Smashed Tobacco Sign.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—Carrie Nation was fined in the police court today \$7.34, for smashing a tobacco advertisement of the "Fube" railway. She was warned that a repetition of the offense would result in a much heavier fine.


