

U. S. CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

Will be Held During the Coming Spring and Those Interested Should Take Notice of Positions.

THE PHILIPPINE SERVICE

Every Position Offered by Uncle Sam is of the Kind That Should Appeal to Young Persons.

During the coming spring season, United States civil service examinations are to be held throughout the United States and persons desiring to secure fine government positions should begin at once to prepare for the examinations which will be held within a short time.

In a letter received at the local government office, J. M. Shoemaker, district secretary of St. Paul, states that the demands of government service have exceeded the supply of eligibles for government positions.

Of Those From This Vicinity Who Have Enrolled as Having Voted For Abraham Lincoln.

ONE WAS A PALL BEARER

Kahoka Man Who Was a Pall Bearer and Hancock County Veteran Who Guarded the Remains.

A day does not pass without The Gate City receiving quite a number of names of people who voted for Lincoln. The following have been received since the last list was furnished by Mrs. Canby:

Rev. A. V. Kendrick was too young to vote, but his father was a private in Lincoln's company in the Black Hawk war. Rev. Kendrick enlisted in Co. A, Thirty-third Iowa. On Jan. 1, 1864 at the age of 17 he was at Little Rock, Ark., but was too young to vote for Lincoln.

G. L. Galvound of No. 1102 Blondeau street voted both times for Lincoln at Paxton Ford county, Ill. Wm. Loewenstein of Fourteenth and Johnson, voted both times for Lincoln.

Jno. Morton of Co. K, Sixteenth Iowa Vol., voted for Lincoln in 1864 in Keokuk.

From Near by Points.

W. A. Taft of Memphis, Mo., cast his first vote for J. C. Fremont and his second one for Lincoln. Since then he has voted for every Republican president.

J. R. Harris of LaHarpe voted for Lincoln both times at Monmouth, Ill. He is now 76 years old. John Newhouse of Montrose, a member of Co. K, Eleventh Iowa, voted for Lincoln in 1864 near Marietta, Ga.

Stephen Shipman of Webster, Hancock county, Ill., voted for him both years and also guarded his body in the hours. He enlisted in Co. F, Eighty-eighth Illinois on August 12, 1862 and was mustered out on July 12, 1865.

John P. Smith of Kahoka was one of the pall bearers for Lincoln. W. H. Rose of Avon, Ill., voted for Lincoln both times. He was a lieutenant in the civil war.

John P. Smith of Kahoka, was one for Lincoln in 1860 in Keokuk and in 1864 at Memphis, Tenn. He was a member of the Third Iowa Cavalry.

P. D. Edwards of Jefferson township Lee county, voted for Lincoln both times.

Thomas C. Chambers, Fort Madison, would like to be enrolled in the "Lincoln voting club." He was a member of Co. E, 19th Iowa Inf., was a "Wideawake" in 1860, and voted for Lincoln in 1864 at New Orleans.

Dr. James McFarland Evans, Salem, Iowa, served in Co. K, 8th Penn., enlisted May 1st, 1861, wounded at battle of Bull Run in the fall of 1862, voted for Lincoln in 1864. Dr. Evans' daughter writes that her father is such a lover of Lincoln that he desires to be listed with the Lincoln voters.

John E. Cochran, Warsaw, Ill., voted for him in 1864.

Henry Hanson, of Warsaw, also voted for Lincoln in 1860 and 1864. Judge Felix T. Hughes voted for Lincoln in 1864, at Memphis, Mo. It required courage to vote the republican ticket in northern Missouri in those days.

W. M. Powers, enlisted November 19, 1861, discharged September 19, 1865. Voted for Lincoln 1864. Edward Walsmith voted for him in 1860-1864.

Sam W. Wakefield voted for Lincoln in 1860 and 1864. Mr. Wakefield also voted for John C. Fremont in 1856. Jesse Webb, 19th Iowa Inf., voted for Lincoln while in the army in 1864.

This morning at 7 o'clock the mercury was up to 10 and two hours after, it had gone up two notches higher. During the day the mercury continued to rise slowly and the day was not at all unpleasant, being merely a nice crisp winter day.

The wind was rather strong all during the night and yesterday, blowing at about a thirty mile clip all of the time. The highest it reached during the storm was thirty-nine miles an hour.
