He, however, came to Iowa in the following year, and settled on the parental farm, which was only a short distance north of Wilton. He was united in marriage to Miss Ruth Casbeer on November 14, 1886, and in the fall of 1888 went to Keokuk where he took up the study of medicine, graduating with high honors at Montrose, and a time he practiced at West Liberty. After then removed to West Liberty, where he resided for six years there, or in June, 1878, he came to Muscatine, and with the exception of a short residence in Kansas and New Mexico, he has lived in this city ever since. One child, Dr. Henry W. Morgridge, died in 1897. Besides Mrs. Morgridge, one daughter, Mrs. W. S. Norton, survives, though Mrs. May Dolson Morgridge has been almost as a daughter to Dr. Morgridge since the death of her husband, Henry Morgridge.
