ESCAPED MURDERER IN COUNTY JAIL

Sheriff Datin Arrested the Man This Morning Near Argyle and Brought Him to This City.

REWARD WAS OFFERED

Murdered a Man in December and Broke Jail in Montgomery County, Mo., on Night of March 2.

Charged with murder in the first degree, a man who escaped from jail March 2 at Montgomery, Mo., was arrested this morning by Sheriff J. J. Datin and locked up in the county jail.

Luther Anderson, alias Curley Anderson is charged with the murder of August Warner at Faber, Mo., last December, the dead man's body being found in the cellar of his home. Anderson was arrested and placed in jail at Mexico, Mo., but later was removed to the jail at Montgomery, Mo., for safe keeping. On the night of March 2, he made his escape together with Frank Lewis and since that time he was reported having been seen in several places in Missouri.

At Argyle a Week. About a week ago he arrived at Argyle and found work in the neighborhood. For the past four days he was working for James Ritchey and was arrested there this morning.

The Anti-Horse Thief Society, put the sheriff next to the fact that Anderson was in the vicinity and last evening sheriff went to Montrose, met a friend there and they rode to Argyle on horseback, arriving there late at night. This morning the sheriff arrested the man, put the handcuffs on him and brought him down to Keokuk on the Rock Island train, from Vincennes, locking him up in the county jail.

There is a reward of \$400 offered for Anderson, \$200 by the state for his arrest and conviction for the murder and \$200 by Audrain county, Mo., for delivering him into the hands of sheriff J. B. Woolery of Mexico, Mo.

Anderson has served in the navy and is thought to be a deserter besides being a murderer and jail breaker.

He was taken to Fort Madison this afternoon.

Was Taken Away. Anderson is charged with killing the man over a horse trade and although he did not admit the murder while here, made numerous statements which disclosed his identity and made it certain that he is the man wanted.

When arrested this morning he had two revolvers in his possession, one stuck into his belt beneath his clothing.

The sheriff was in the house while Anderson was outside getting some wood. When he came into the door with a big load of wood in his arms, the sheriff met him, covered him with his revolver and told him to stand still. Anderson wanted to drop the wood but was not allowed to and the handcuffs were slipped on him as he stood there with the wood in his arms. He was then searched and the two revolvers taken from him.

Sheriff Datin left on the afternoon train with his man, taking him to Fort Madison where he will keep him until the Missouri officers come for him.

HELEN BLAIRE ON FINE TRIP SOUTH

Captain Walter Blair and a Party of Fifty Friends Will Make a Long Trip Down the River.

NEW BOATS WILL APPEAR

There Will be Over Two Hundred Men Employed by the Diamond Jo During the Present Season.

The boat season which will start in earnest on next Monday in local waters, will be a busy one in the excursion line as well as in the freight and general passenger traffic on the river. Already the Diamond Jo and several other lines on the upper river are making plans for the running of excursions which are popular as a summer pleasure and never out of date.

The excursion season never starts much earlier than the middle of May and has always gotten a fair start by Decoration day, on which day different societies and lodges give an excursion to some nearby point, making a delightful outing for a holiday.

With the opening of the season, the Diamond Jo steamboat line will have in its employ as clerks, officers, steamboat men and others, about 200 men. A number have been added to the regular last year crews and the payroll of the company will run into the thousands of dollars each week.

The Carnival City or White Collar line will have somewhere in the neighborhood of 125 men, many new ones being added with the placing of several new boats with the other older ones of the line. This season the Carnival City Packet company will have six boats in the trade, four old and two new boats, namely the Columbia, Helen Blair, Keokuk, Wenona, Silver Crescent and Blackhawk.

The Silver Crescent, which ran into this city and was used in the Keokuk-Quincy trade for a number of years is at present on the ways at Wabasha, Wis., being almost wholly rebuilt by Peters Bros., the builders of the steamer Keokuk.

On the Helen Blair, extensive and expensive repairs are being made to her at Rock Island. During the early spring a cruise will be made on her by Captain Walter Blair and a party of a half hundred friends.

The trip will go down the Mississippi 550 miles, 75 miles up the Ohio, 200 miles up the Cumberland to Memphis, Tenn., visiting all points of interest along the way and returning some time in May. The trip will cover about 1,650 miles and will be an enjoyable outing for the members of Captain Blair's party.

Regarding the trip, an exchange has the following to say: On the way, stops will be made at different points of interest, including Fort Donnellson, and two days will be spent in Nashville, allowing ample time, it is figured for the members of Capt. Blair's party, which it is expected will number about fifty, to make a tour of the city and to visit both "The Hermitage" and Mammoth cave. Capt. Blair himself will be in charge, Charles Van Aken, the engineer, and the cabin and kitchen crew will be the same as was employed when the boat made the trip to Riverton, Alabama, a year ago. Local pilots will be employed, one from Davenport to St. Louis one from St. Louis to Paducah and one from Paducah to Nashville. On the return of the Helen Blair she will return to her regular schedule in the Burlington-Davenport trade, alternating during the tourist season with the Columbia.

Quincy-Hannibal. In a recent excellently prepared river article, the Quincy Herald has the following to say regarding the running of a packet between that city and Hannibal:

It is reported, but the report is not confirmed, that Capt. Blair contemplates putting one of his boats in service between Hannibal and Quincy, if not this year, possibly next season. It seems that if he has any such plan it would be to his profit to begin the service this summer and take advantage of the rivalry between the two ports much heavier will be the first and possibly the last season the two teams will be in the same league, and the rivalry should be great enough to make travel between the two ports much heavier than under the ordinary conditions.

At any rate this season would doubtless be the best to give the scheme for packet service between Hannibal and Quincy a trial. And business is bound to be still better, if the Adams Brothers dispose of their excursion steamer Uncle Sam, which, according to Frank Adams, is not so improbable as many seem to think. They do not intend to sell, however, unless they get their desired price, and will book excursions this spring as in former years.

Steaming increasing. That steaming and transportation by river is increasing with each incoming season is shown by the increase of river packets, several of which are known locally having built a number of new boats for the present season to be added to the fleet of boats which are already in their possession.

In the younger days of Keokuk, this city was one of the most important river towns along the Mississippi and the older residents of the city never tire of telling the younger generation of those days when steamboating on the great river was at its best. There are many who do not realize of what importance the river on which the city is fortunately located, has been toward the growth and development of this city.

LORILLARD DEATH WAS SUICIDE

Wife of Tobacco Magnate Was Instrumental in Her Own Death.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Coroner Nevitt today filed in the health office a certificate in the death of Mrs. Pierie Lorillard, the wife of the tobacco magnate who was found dead yesterday, assigning death due to "suicide by asphyxiation." The coroner said, "There is absolutely no doubt in my mind that it was a case of suicide." He explained his reason for not reporting the death to the police early in the day was that he first wished to ascertain positively the cause. This was established by an autopsy, taking also into consideration the contents of a letter left by Mrs. Lorillard, which was not made public.

Suicide is Admitted. "Bury this with me unopened." This parting request was written on an envelope secreted in the clothing on the dead body of Mrs. Lorillard. Inside the envelope was found two notes—one in her own hand-writing, signed "C. H. L." the other in the hand-writing of another. There was also found a few trinkets. This afternoon the body will be placed in a hermetically sealed casket, and the envelope released and placed in the casket. Save to the husband and the coroner the contents of the notes are unknown.

In spite of the coroner's verdict it was first claimed by the family that death was accidental. Now, however, suicide is admitted. Lorillard this afternoon spoke of his wife's moroseness, her recurrent fits over despondency.
