

FIVE JUNIORS HAVE ADVENTURE

Merry Time Resulted From Effort of Class of '10 to Place Colors on the High Staff Last Evening.

AN EXCITING CHASE

Principal Reid Frustrates Effort of Juniors Because of Negligence of Scouts on Watch at the Door.

Principal R. L. Reid and five members of the junior class of the Keokuk high school figured in a near-midnight adventure in the high school building last evening which resulted in the placing of a '10 pennant on the flag staff of the school, a merry chase through the assembly room and the upper and lower halls, a twenty foot jump by one of the juniors which nearly resulted in serious injuries and an escape through the gloom of the high school campus.

The Arrival. Five members of the junior class arrived at the high school building shortly after 9 o'clock last evening bent upon hoisting the class colors high in the breeze during the night and triumphantly enjoying the spectacle the next morning.

Upon their arrival at the school two scouts were placed on the outside of the building to signal the approach of any enemies, while the other three with the bunting, tacks, hammer and other supplies made their way cautiously through a previouslly arranged entrance and stole to the attic. Up the ladder to the roof of the building the three juniors made their way and soon were at work tacking the class colors and an American flag to the high flag staff.

Scouts Fall Asleep. While this active work was going on the two scouts or guards were not so active. They must have fallen asleep while on watch or else Principal Reid was in the school when the juniors arrived, for soon an enemy was discovered in camp.

It is thought that Principal Reid was in the school without any knowledge of what was going on and in walking about the halls his footsteps were heard by those at work putting up the bunting.

MISS ZOLA PICKARDE TAKES OWN LIFE

An Overdose of Morphine Caused Death at Nauvoo Thursday Morning—Was Visiting There.

Miss Zola Pickarde of Niles, Michigan, passed away at the home of Dr. Carnes at Nauvoo at 9:45 o'clock Thursday morning, from an overdose of morphine says the Montrose Journal, which she took Monday evening with suicidal intent. Miss Pickarde was a cornetist of great ability and has played in the best musical organizations in nearly every city of any size in the United States and Canada. For the last few months she has had charge of the orchestra playing in the Boston Oyster House in Chicago. Miss Pickarde had been the constant traveling companion of Miss Esther Carnes, of this place, who is also a cornetist for the past four years, and

three weeks ago they were separated for the first time during that whole period, Miss Carnes going to Winnipeg, Canada, to take charge of an orchestra there. The separation was too much for Miss Pickarde in her overworked condition and she came to Montrose Monday evening hunting Esther. She arrived here on the 8:13 train and went to the home of Dr. Carnes, finding only the doctor's mother at home, she took an overdose of morphine and before Mrs. Carnes realized what had happened she fell to the floor and clung to Mrs. Carnes' skirts to prevent her from telephoning for the doctor, which she did as soon as she could extricate herself from the unconscious woman's grasp. Three physicians and a nurse were in constant attendance upon her but to no avail, she never regained consciousness and passed away this morning.

Overwork and worry had unbalanced her mind and she was not accountable for her rash act. Miss Pickarde had visited in Montrose with Miss Esther at the Carnes home, a good many times and only last fall she spent two months here before taking up their work in Chicago.

Mrs. Elizabeth Davis, mother of the unfortunate young woman and a nephew, Mr. Clyde Cutting arrived from Niles, Mich., Tuesday evening. Miss Esther Carnes was telegraphed for and arrived here last evening.

Deceased is survived by her parents and several brothers and sisters in Michigan.

The remains will be taken to Niles, Mich., for burial.


