





A. on Friday evening to plan for future social events that are to be given. —F. L. Hagny, a former resident of Keokuk, has arrived here from San Antonio, Texas, for a short visit with his mother, Mrs. N. K. Hagny and brother, J. C., of 825 Orleans street. He is an employee of the Santa Fe. —Tomorrow evening the newly elected officers of Keokuk lodge No. 106 of the Elks, will be installed and a social session will be held after the meeting. J. R. Fraley of Fort Madison, district deputy, has promised to be in attendance at the meeting. —Three marriage licenses were issued late yesterday afternoon as follows: H. E. Clark of Des Moines and Flossie D. Grisson of Albia; Allen R. Burns and Mary E. Wadden of Keokuk; Bryant Greshby of Galesburg and Fanny Wilson of Keokuk, both colored. —Foreman Grant Wildman and his force of workmen have finished their part of the work on restringing the electric company's wires on the Keokuk and Hamilton Bridge. Work of reeling up the large cable which was blown down was begun today by the Western Union men. —Over in the Sixth ward Jim Roberts is making a fine race for councilmen. Mr. Roberts did not seek the nomination but now that he is a candidate he is no "quitter" and his friends are rallying to his support. He stands well in the ward and he should receive a large vote. Men of all political parties are giving him their support. —Kewanee fans and citizens are live ones according to President M. E. Justice, of the Central association, who has returned home from a day's visit at the big carnival which is being held in that city during the week. He says the attractions are the best he has ever seen at an affair of that kind and thus far the carnival has been a great success. Enthusiasm is intense in Kewanee according to Mr. Justice, and one baseball game there made the statement that should the team get away good during the season and meet with success an attendance of 20,000 is looked for. The best people of Kewanee support baseball and the carnival this week is assembling the leading society circles. The entertainment afforded is excellent and is not only an amusement nature, but is highly instructive in many ways. —Smoke Moeller's Silver Ash cigar —In the district court, default has been entered in the case of Ira Jones vs. Lilly Jones. —March, which came in like a lamb, is going out in the same mild manner today. —Sixth ward Republicans should give Jim Roberts their earnest and active support. He is making a fine race for councilman and if his party is loyal to him he will be elected. —Carroll's U. S. Carnival Company has made arrangements to come to Keokuk for the week beginning May 23 and will pitch its tents at Tenth and Franklin streets. —In the Y. M. C. A. pool tournament last evening, Roy Strickler defeated Bob Ulrich by a score of 60 to 27 and Fred Maxwell won from Minor Clark by a score of 50 to 32. —Two cancelled checks were found on North Third street the other day which date back to September 28, 1857. One is for \$400 and the other for \$100 made out to James H. Baker and signed by D. H. Kildrone. —The fourth dwelling house to be entirely destroyed by fire in the outskirts of the city, was the one burned early this morning when the home of a colored woman named Mrs. Lucretia Ruben at Twenty-fourth and Burke streets, in Messengerville, was entirely consumed. The department responded this morning at 1:30 o'clock but was unable to save a single shingle of the house owing to the distance. The chemical engine was used to save the adjoining houses and sheds but the one story frame house which was on fire was burned clear to the ground. Mrs. Ruben did not have time to save anything excepting her life. —T. W. Holman, of Rutledge, Mo., was in Keokuk today on his way to St. Louis where he will make final arrangements for the trip of the Shiloh battlefield survivors, leaving St. Louis on the boat April 2. Mr. Holman is the commander of the Association and has been for a number of years. This evening a large number of Illinois comrades and their ladies will meet Mr. Holman in this city and go with him to the battlefield, where the annual reunion will be held. At the present time Mr. Holman has 95 comrades and forty-six ladies on his list. The excursionists are preparing for a big time. Mr. Holman is one of the most enthusiastic comrades and the old soldiers always like to go with him. He is a member of the 21st Missouri Infantry. —Fourth ward Republicans named a good man for the office of alderman when they selected Willis Mundy. He is a young man of energy and of character. He will be able to give to the ward an intelligent service. Mr. Mundy has resided in the Fourth ward for a number of years and he will take especial pains to give to the ward and to the city the attention that it deserves. 
