BELT LOOKS TO SPEED OF TEAM

Every Player Signed Can Burn up Ground Between Bases and Will Not Block Progression.

A BOX FOR THE SCORERS

Bench, Inclosed on All Sides Will Probably be Arranged Over Grand Stand—Other Notes of Sport.

One thing that gives Manager Frank Belt more confidence than anything else on the eve of the spring training season, is the fact that he has gathered about him a corps of speed artists, who will burn up the path between the bases at Hulinger park and throughout the Central Association. It is not exaggerating in the least when "Pa" Belt makes the statement that he will have an aggregation of ball players who will be seventy-five per cent faster than last year's team.

Think you residents of fandom, what that means. Seventy-five per cent faster men getting down to first base, going to second, rounding third and galloping home. Men will be with us who know how to slide to bases after the fashion of the big leaguers. Players who know when to slide feet first and when to take the toboggan headfirst, and are able to slide to right or left.

Belt made the statement this morning that his effort was to get men of speed, players who could be sent around the diamond with little assistance, and not have some player get to first and entirely block the progression.

Belt speaks very highly of every player he has signed, with any degree of certainty that they will make good, as to their base running ability. He is certain that Reichle, Miller and Corriden will improve a great deal in this department of the game. Both of the shortstops and the two outfield basemen are speedy, and the outfield is especially fast.

For the Scorers. The Sport Writers' Association of the Central Association has a friend in Manager Belt and already he is figuring on a good scorers' bench for local members of this organization. His plan as presented this morning is to "put the bench on top of the grand stand directly behind the bat, that is in a direct line. The little structure will be entirely closed in to protect the scorers from the wind and rain and will likewise be away from the players and spectators.

In the past the spectators have been a source of worry to the men scoring and on a crowded day the scoring bench would not only contain newspaper men, but spectators as well. The bench was also too near the players which is a bad feature.

Visiting Grounds. Belt went out to the grounds yesterday afternoon and made arrangements for the work which is to be done there. A man was employed this morning and the work commenced.

It will not be necessary to make many improvements. The diamonds are in fair shape and a little working of the ground will put the field in good condition.

Belt had planned for a time to cut away the hills back of the catcher, but this plan has been abandoned.

A number of minor repairs will be made in the dressing and bath rooms, although the manager found everything as he left them last season. A new stove is needed but the two shower baths are still intact and ready for use.

Cosgrove Has Signed. Burlington Gazette: Outfielder Cosgrove, at the last of the holdouts on the local base ball club, has signed a contract. Manager Egan received Cosgrove's contract this morning, a satisfactory salary arrangement having been reached. He will report in two weeks and will be one of the regulars in the business. Cosgrove made a good showing in the early part of last year. He is one of the most feet base runners on the team. Roan and Maunch, who were holding out, have also signed contracts and everything is lovely.

THE WINCHESTER SHOOTING AFFAIR

Man in Keokuk Hospital is Accused of Throwing Bricks at One Who Shot Him.

A Kahoka newspaper has the following to say of the shooting affair at Winchester, Mo., of last week: The village of Winchester, twelve miles southeast of Kahoka, was the scene of a shooting affair last Friday evening in which Joseph Phillips and Harvey Reed were the principals.

The latter was severely wounded and is now in the Graham hospital at Keokuk, in a serious condition. There was ill feeling between the two men because Reed had testified against Phillips in a "booze case" some months ago. They met in the evening of the day named at the drug store in Winchester and a war of words ensued. Phillips, it is said, ordered Reed from the store and told him to stay away. The latter went out and commenced throwing stones and brick bats. Phillips made his appearance and fired three shots, two of which took effect in Reed's face, one striking him between the eyes and the other entering his cheek. The one between the eyes penetrated the frontal bone, the other glanced. It seems a miracle that he was not killed outright but strange as it may appear he remained conscious and able to walk and talk. He was taken to the hospital, by Dr. H. W. Harris, the same evening.

Phillips came in Saturday morning, bringing the gun and the missiles thrown, and surrendered to the authorities. He was arraigned before Squire Murphy, who fixed his bond at \$1,000, which was furnished, and the defendant given his liberty.

Phillips claims Reed was throwing rocks at him and that he shot in self defense. It is alleged that both parties were under the influence of liquor.
