## IOWA ASYLUM SCANDAL IS DUE

Sensational Report is Expected in the Home State Investigating Committee.

DES MOINES, April 5.—A sensational committee report is expected in the house on Tuesday. Recently a committee consisting of Brandes, Fulliam, and McCleary was appointed to report whether the charges made against attendants at the insane asylum were sufficiently well founded to demand legislative investigation.

The committee has been holding secret hearings for several days. Yesterday members of the board of control were invited to take part and the board of control were invited to take part and the board of control demanded that superintendents, doctors and supervisors at the asylum be summoned as witnesses.

Charge Abuse of Patients. Some of the complainants and many letters the committee have received charge attendants with beating, choking, and otherwise abusing patients to reduce them to subjection. It was claimed by the officers of the institutions that whenever any attendant used undue force he at once was dismissed.

During the hearing yesterday Judge Robinson of the board of control examined the witnesses on behalf of the institutions, while Dr. Fulliam cross-examined them in regard to statements made by former patients who have been before the committee.

A statement appeared in the Des Moines papers this morning that the result of the investigation yesterday was to exonerate the institutions from the charges, though it was said that the committee probably would bring in a report giving much credence to the statements made by complaining witnesses.

Dr. Fulliam was indignant over this publication. He said the statement that the officers of the institutions disproved the evidence in the hands of the committee was not a fact.
