

DEATH FOLLOWED RETURN TO CITY

Mrs. Katherine Kimble Passed Away at 6 O'clock This Morning Shortly After Return From Burlington.

CAUSED BY PNEUMONIA

Had Been Sick But a Week When She Left This Earth to Join Husband, Who Died a Year Ago.

Mrs. Catherine Kimble, but a short time returned from Burlington, passed away this morning at 6 o'clock, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William Kirchner, 141 1/2 Concert street, after a week's illness of pneumonia. Mrs. Kimble had left Keokuk about six months ago, following the death of her husband, and had made her home in Burlington with her daughter. She returned to Keokuk a week ago last Monday and almost immediately contracted pneumonia which proved serious and resulted in her demise this morning. Her rather unlooked for death is a sad blow to many relatives.

Catherine Kirchner was born in Barren, Germany, on Christmas day, fifty-eight years ago, and came to this country with her parents at the age of sixteen years. After living for a short time in this city the family went to Antioch, Mo., where the parents remained to live, and the daughter later came to Keokuk, her marriage to J. H. Kimble occurring in this city at the age of eighteen years.

Husband's Death.

It will be remembered by Keokuk people that the death of Mr. Kimble occurred a year ago last February, following a fall while working at the Peckstein-Nagel Co.

Mrs. Kimble was a member of one of the societies of the Lutheran church. The surviving relatives are the following: Daughters, Mrs. William Kirchner of this city and Mrs. J. M. Gamble of Burlington; sons: William H. Kimble of Lemoore, Calif., and Joseph L. of Los Angeles, Calif., four grandsons and one granddaughter.

The out-of-town relatives are expected to arrive for the funeral and the announcement will not be made pending word from them.

Bennett Bill Satisfactory. Both the temperance people and the better class of saloon men are satisfied with the senate bill by Bennett which passed the house today prohibiting breweries to be in any way interested in the local liquor traffic in Iowa. Both sides agree it will have a tendency to add more responsibility to the management of saloons and thereby keep the standard of law observance higher.

The senate committee on railroads this afternoon by vote of 6 to 7 failed to report the house commerce counsel bill which passed the latter body yesterday.

The house defeated the bill by Calkins providing for the assessment of mortgages as an interest in the real estate encumbered.

House passed senate bill by Seelye providing that shares of stock in foreign corporations owned by citizens of this state shall not be taxed in Iowa if the corporation pays taxes in another state.

Detective Goes to Penitentiary.

DES MOINES, Iowa, April 8.—Ell Hardin, former chief of detectives, of Des Moines, must serve three years in Fort Madison penitentiary, the state supreme court having affirmed his conviction on the charge of being a party in a conspiracy to prevent certain witnesses giving testimony in the case against S. 

VICTORY FOR THE STANDARD

By Coalition Between Republican Surgeons and Democrats, Advocates of Free Crude Oil and Products, Victorious.

CANNON MAKES APPEAL

Speaker Made Personal But Vain Appeal to Republicans to Stand by Ways and Means Committee.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Yesterday was a bad day for the republican organization of the house. By coalition between some republican "insurgents" and democrats, the ways and means committee was bowled over and the advocates of free crude oil and its products won the victory when the amendment by Norris, of Nebraska, placing the insignificant duty of one per centum ad valorem on those articles was adopted by a substantial majority.

The decision of the chairman that amendments could not be offered to the oil schedule other than the one covered by the special rule of last Monday, which provided for the removal of the countervailing duty on crude petroleum and applying an ad valorem duty of 25 per cent was overturned, and not even a fervid appeal by the speaker, in an endeavor to rally the republican forces was sufficient to stem the tide avowedly against the Standard Oil company. By a practically unanimous vote the countervailing duty went out as the committee has recommended. On all other propositions the committee was sustained. The barley schedule ran the gauntlet without a change; tea and coffee were placed on the free list, and the duty on barytes increased from 75 cents a ton to a dollar and a half a ton.

Cannon Made Appeal. Speaker Cannon yesterday made a personal but vain appeal to the republicans of the house to stand by the

ways and means committee's report on the oil schedule of the Payne tariff bill.

When the oil schedule was reached Vreeland, on behalf of the ways and means committee, offered an amendment striking out the countervailing duty and fixing the duty of 25 per cent ad valorem. Norris, of Nebraska, moved a substitute providing for the duty of 1 per cent ad valorem. Against this Dazell made a point of order, as it was not included in the committee proposition, it could not be entertained.

A vigorous appeal was made by Campbell, of Kansas, for protection of independent oil producers, who, he said, needed protection, while the Standard company did not.

A bitter attack against the Standard Oil company was made by Cooper, of Wisconsin, in favoring Norris' amendment.

Seeing the wave of sentiment in favor of the amendment, Cannon took the floor and warned the members of the danger ahead. He made a plea for the American producer of oil. The amendment, he declared, was designed to punish the wicked Standard Oil company.

"Gentlemen," he said, "is it not well enough to see when you seek to punish somebody that you claim is bad that you do not, like Samson, pull down the pillars and have the temple fall upon you?"

The adoption of the Norris amendment, he said, would let in practically free refined oil from Mexico, "and still the gentleman from Wisconsin and others flap their wings and crow and crucify people while they as demagogues are denouncing the wicked Standard Oil."
