### ELECTRIC HEAD LIGHTS USED

Bill Providing For the Use of Same by Missouri Roads Recently Introduced in the Senate.

### NEW NIGHT YARDMASTER

Also Night Foreman to be Appointed. Emery Having Accepted a Position With the Santa Fe.

Commencing Sunday night there will be a new night yardmaster in the C. B. & Q. yards of this city O. W. Emery formerly holding the position, going to Marcelline, Mo., where he has accepted a like position in the Santa Fe yards at that place. Thomas Switchman, will be appointed to fill the place vacated by Emery and J. E. McFarland will be foreman and handle the orders.

One of the largest stock trains handled by the local branch of the T. P. & W. was brought to the city this morning at 6 o'clock by No. 79 from St. Louis and taken out over the "Tip-Up" at 6:30 to LaHarpe, Ill. The train was made up of seven full stock cars for that place.

A new electric semaphore light was placed on the semaphore at the union station this morning. This will take the place of the oil lamp which has heretofore been used and will be gladly welcomed by the railroad men. All work in the union depot has been completed and the interior makes a fine appearance and more credit to the city. The wood work has been nicely varnished and the brick walls of the interior enameled.

"The Girl from Over There," an opera company, passed through the city this morning, on No. 12, for Quincy, where the company will play tonight. A large fifty foot baggage car was carried by the train.

A bill recently introduced in the senate by Senator McAllister of Missouri for all Missouri railroads to adopt the electric headlight for locomotives instead of using the old oil lamps will no doubt be passed.

The first section of the bill reads as follows:

Section 1. That all companies, corporations, lessees, owners, operators or receivers of any railroad or railway company operating a railroad or railway in whole or in part in this state are hereby required to equip, maintain and use upon every locomotive being operated in road service in this state in the night time an electric headlight of fifteen hundred candle power brilliancy, measured without the aid of a reflector, or other headlight of not less than fifteen hundred candle power brilliancy measured without the aid of a reflector, and classification signals of not less than six candle power.
