After securing the license, they sought up Rev. Lilly of the First Christian church and were married by him at his home, the wedding being witnessed by the members of the minister's family.

Kept it Secret. After the wedding, the couple left Keokuk and returned to their homes, keeping the wedding a secret from their friends.

The bride gave her age as twenty years and her home at Albia. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Grissom and is employed as cashier in a grocery store there, where she is still in charge and is known as a "miss."

The groom gave his age as 25 and his residence as Des Moines, his occupation being that of a traveling salesman. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Clark of Centerville and was born in that city.

The young couple did not tell their friends of their marriage and a great many of them do not know of it yet, although some of them are very suspicious. The bride has been accused of being married, but has been strenuously denying it at home.

It is said that the couple ran away from Albia to be married.




