## LANDRY HELPS DEFEAT CLUB

Keokuk Outfielder is Not Only a Ball Player But is a Bowler—Keokuk Club Lost to All-Star Team.

## A DIFFERENCE OF 2 PINS

All-Stars Totalled 2405 as Against 2403 For the Keokuk Club—Smith Was Not in the Match Game.

Jack Landry, who is in the city trying out for an outfield position on the Keokuk baseball team, is not only a ball player but a bowler as well. Saturday evening he helped materially in defeating the Keokuk Club bowlers at the Keokuk Club alleys, the result of the match being: All-Stars, 2405; Keokuk Club, 2403. Landry had an average of 165, which is very good on strange alleys.

The contest was a very close one and the finish was hot, the Keokuk Club being a good many pins ahead at the opening of the third game, but the All-Star aggregation totaled 843 in the third game of the series and went to the front.

High average went to E. W. Cox with 175, Taber second with 173, and Maas third, 167.

The Club won the first game, but dropped the second and third. Smith was unable to bowl in Saturday evening's match.

LaVelle and Carroll alternated for the regulars while Blue Jacket, Jepsun and Prough did the mound work for the Yannigans. None of the pitchers pressed themselves but worked easily.

Belt was on first for the Regulars with Lutke at second, Corriden covering third and Carroll and Hildebrand taking short. This infield look fairly good although the play was very loose. Landry was in left and looked good. Relchle played well in center and Hildebrand was in right part of the time. Hildebrand is a left hand fielder and a batter and is a good man.

For the Yannigans Horton was on first, De Silve on Second, Blue Packet on third and Spivins on short. The shortstop claims big league experience and wanted a tryout with Belt, that is he wanted to stall through board and room for a week, but Frank could not see it that way, and he left this morning for Quincy. Bramble, Bell and Hayes were in the outfield. The last two are local players.

The play throughout the entire session was loose and careless and the game was simply for the purpose of loosening up.

The pitching staff looks extremely good and Belt is confident that he has a class of box artists who will make the league burn up. All are big men with speed and an assortment of curves good enough for the league. Belt expects other players today.

## TABULATED SCORE OF K. H. S. GAME

Keokuk Team Displayed Some Weakness at Hitting, But the Team's Fielding Was Exceptionally Good.

## PECHSTEIN'S HOME RUN

In the Second Inning With Two Men Down Was the Feature of Game Which Ended in Score of 3 to 2.

The Keokuk-Carthage High school base ball game at Hubinger Park Saturday afternoon, as reported briefly by the Gate City in Saturday evening's issue, was a fitting opening for the season of 1909, although weather conditions were not the best, and especially for the one hundred or more spectators who partly filled the bleachers and grandstand. The score of 3 to 2 well represents the closeness of the struggle, but the Keokuk team was in the lead during the entire session.

The feature of the game that stands out more prominently than any other was the terrific home run of Pechstein in the second inning. This fierce clout to the right field fence took the ginger out of the Carthaginians and brought howls of delight from the spectators lips. Pech stepped to the plate in the second with two down and swung at a fast one beating it far over the right fielders head. He rounded the bases with little difficulty.

Salzer started the twirling for the Keokuk team and for the first six innings was a complete puzzle to the Carthage batsmen. Weismann supplanted Salzer in the seventh inning but was a little off form and in the eighth inning Carthage came mighty near winning. Two hits, a base on ball and a hit by pitcher gave Carthage one run and left three men on bases. A hit to Duncan retired the side.

N. Kiedaisch did the receiving in very good style his catching being especially good as against a slight weakness in throwing to bases. At first P. King played and Duncan at short accepted every chance. The outfield had little to do.

## THE PROGRAM OF THE REGATTA

Boat Races at Burlington Next July Will Furnish Plenty of Sport.

Burlington Gazette: The grand free-for-all race in the regatta of the Mississippi Valley Power Boat association which will be held in this city on July 5 and 6, has been assigned to Monday, the first day of the event, by the racing committee, which met in the office of Chairman J. W. Dixon here yesterday. This event will be one of the most interesting of the regatta, and is expected to develop some of the liveliest contests of the two days' races. The setting of the date for the free for all on July 5, which will be a holiday, insures large crowds, but the action of the committee in placing the main event on the first day is being severely criticized and there is considerable agitation on foot to have the race switched over to the second day of the event.

With this exception the program of the regatta is well arranged and provided two days of interesting sport for the legions of motor boat enthusiasts which will be in attendance. As adopted the program is as follows:

- Monday, July 5.
- 10:00 a. m.—Half cabin cruisers, 15 miles.
- 11:15 a. m.—Novelty race, prize to the slowest boat, ¼ mile and return.
- 11:45 a. m.—Backwards race, ¼ mile and return.
- 1:30 p. m.—Twenty-six foot and under, 10 miles.
- 2:30 p. m.—Thirty-six foot and under, 10 miles.
- 3:30 p. m.—Grand free for all.
- Tuesday July 6.
- 9:00 a. m.—Full cabin cruiser, 30 miles.
- 1:30 p. m.—Twenty foot and under, 10 miles.
- 2:30 p. m.—Twenty-two foot and under, 10 miles.
- 3:30 p. m.—Speed trial, 1 mile against time, open to all boats.

An excursion steamer will be chartered at Muscatine to carry the enthusiasts from that city to Burlington, while a number of racing craft and two high power boats will come from Peoria. 
