

DEATH RESULTED FROM INJURIES

Man Seriously Injured in the Explosion of DuPont Powder Mills Died at St. Joseph's Hospital.

IS A DOUBLE SORROW

Nine Year Old Son Who Came Here With Wife of Unfortunate Man is Also Very Low at Hospital.

George M. Hodgen, who was in the recent explosion of the Du Pont Powder Mills at Pond Du Lac, and received internal injuries died at St. Joseph's hospital last evening, his injuries proving fatal. The terrific explosion occurred several months ago and Mr. Hodgen, who is a middle aged man, was one of the victims. He received injuries in the region of his heart and some time later he was removed to the hospital in this city for treatment.

Mary S. Getz Charges Father With Abandoning His Child and Property. A suit has been filed in the district court by Mary S. Getz vs. John L. Singleton, asking judgment for \$1,465. The petition states that on April 2, 1898, the wife of the defendant was adjudged insane and sent to the hospital. That the defendant made an arrangement with her to take his child, then less than one year of age, and keep it, agreeing to pay \$9 per month for its care, also to furnish clothing and school books when it grew up.

GIGLINGER WARNS SALOONKEEPERS

Has Notified a Saloonkeeper That He Must Keep His Place of Business Closed on the Sabbath.

HE MEANS BUSINESS

Dislikes to Take Extreme Measures But Lawlessness of Some Saloonkeepers May Force Him to do so.

Rev. Dr. G. Giglinger has notified a saloonkeeper who keeps open on Sunday morning to the detriment of some young men in whom he is especially interested, to keep his saloon closed Sunday morning or he will be obliged to take out an injunction against it. Father Giglinger states that he dislikes going to extremes in anything but the lawlessness of some saloonkeepers may compel him to do so. He says that according to what he considers reliable information all the saloons with the exception of about four manage to sell liquor on Sundays and after closing hours on week days. A large number of saloons are, according to his information simply rotten and win rooms and evil resorts play an important part in connection with liquor traffic in bringing about the physical and moral ruin of our young people.

What He Says.

"This cannot last, and the end, it is to be hoped, will soon come. Most of our saloonkeepers have to blame but themselves for the annoyances to which they are exposed. They entice young and old for the sake of a nickel and humor the drunkard until he has dug a hole in his pocket to find another five cent piece, and then they kick him out. A large percentage of divorces and of ruined homes is directly traceable to the saloon. The agitation against the present day saloon meth-od will not be based on principles of lawlessness, drunkenness and exploitation, but on principles of good citizenship, which means the observance of law and the treatment of man as a human being."

Rockefeller Loses Libel Case.

NEW YORK, April 13.—The writ of habeas corpus secured in behalf of S. S. Carvalho, Bradford Merrill and Edward H. Clark, officers of the Star company, publishers of the New York American and Evening Journal, in an action brought against them for criminal libel on complaint of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was upheld by Justice Gerrard in the supreme court today, and the defendants were ordered discharged.

Employing Actresses.

Outside of the few accredited employment agencies for professionals, the bureaus which pretend to hire young women for the stage are unreliable and often are operated with criminal motives.


