MANY NEW SUITS WERE FILED

Last Day For Filing Suits For the Coming Term of the District Court, Brought Flood of Them.

ONE OF THEM FOR \$15,000

A Montrose Woman Blames Saloon For the Death of Her Husband Who Was Killed by Zack Andrews.

Today is the last day for filing suits for the May term of the District court and this morning there was a flood of new petitions filed with Clerk Lofton, with more expected during the afternoon. Among those filed this morning were the following: D. W. Anderson vs. Keokuk Electric Railway and Power Co. In this suit the plaintiff asks judgment for \$2,850 from the street car company for the assault upon him on the evening of March 31 by Edward Arnd, the conductor on a street car. The alleged assault was noted in these columns the day after it happened. The petition states that Anderson had the bones broken in the thumb and finger of his left hand, received bruises about the head and shoulders, a gash in the head and was sick and sore from the assault. He asks \$1,500 damages, \$50 for medical care, \$100 for the time he lost from his work and \$1,000 exemplary damages.

Husband Was Killed.
Mary Bunker of Montrose brings suit against the Lelsy Brewing Co., and R. S. Latta for the death of her husband in Montrose a short time ago, he having been killed by Zack Andrews who is now in the asylum. She asks \$15,000 from defendants charging that they sold liquor to her husband and that while he was intoxicated he was killed by Andrews.

S. F. Baker Co., sue O. S. Welch for \$79.96, on an agreement which is alleged to have not been fulfilled. The Keokuk Loan and Building Association files a suit against Mary Harrington and others asking the foreclosure of a mortgage on lots 7 and 8 in block 75.

Annie C. Hickey brings suit against Charles Griffin for \$50 on a note alleged to be due and unpaid. Blom Collier Co., sue W. F. Cook for \$137.60 on a note, alleged to be due and unpaid.

C. Schmitt brings suit against the Keokuk Electric Railway and Power Co., and F. J. Warner, to quiet the title to lot 5, in block 12.

Margaret Seth brings suit against Arthur Horsey and asking that the court set aside a real estate transfer made by defendant and declare her judgment of \$1,000 against him, to be a first lien on the property. She secured judgment a year ago in the District court and the same has not been satisfied.

Another Big One.
The Illinois Western Telephone Co. has filed a petition for mandamus against the Mississippi Valley Telephone Co. asking that the defendant be made to restore the exchange relations once existing between the two companies. The petition states that plaintiff has been damaged to the amount of \$50,000 and that defendant has failed to pay over about \$3,000 due to it.

WILL MOVE ICE WITH DYNAMITE

Explosions will be Used to Loose Ice Jam at Mouth of Niagara River.

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 22.—Two thousand pounds of dynamite is on the way from Youngston by wagon train, and will be used in an effort to loosen the ice jam at the mouth of the Niagara river. Further orders for explosives have been given and will be rushed to the scene as soon as possible. The dynamiting will begin today, and as the ice is mushy it is expected the operators will be successful. The ice is from ten to sixty feet thick and extends twelve miles. The head of the huge glacier was being pushed out on Lake Ontario, but was grounded on a sand bar, sticking there, with ice piling up behind.


—There is great interest in the city over the recount of the votes cast at the last city election. Numerous telephone calls were received last evening at the Gate City office from people, asking how the recount had come out.

HENDY CHADWICK, FATHER OF BASEBALL, AND SHAFT UNVEILED AT THE GRAVE.



[Brooklyn, April 22.—The monument erected at the grave of Henry Chadwick, "father of baseball," was unveiled in Greenwood cemetery yesterday with fitting ceremonies. Many prominent baseball men and others who also knew and loved the grand old patron of the national game were present at the unveiling. The monument, which is a simple granite shaft bearing a bronze tablet and surmounted by a granite ball, was designed by Miss Florence S. Richter, daughter of the editor of Sporting Life. It was purchased with funds contributed by the owners of the National league clubs and other admirers of Mr. Chadwick and was unveiled on the anniversary of his death.]
