

KEOKUK PLAYED ERRORLESS BALL

Indians Put up Great Exhibition of the National Game Yesterday Afternoon at Hubinger Park.

THE SCORE WAS 9 TO 0

Jepson and Carroll Were on the Mound For Keokuk and Allowed But Five Scattered Hits.

"Cap" Yeager and his bunch of scattered raters could not hope to cope with the edge ball put up by the Indians yesterday afternoon at Hubinger park, and "Pa" Bell's war tribe clearly demonstrated its ability as a contender for championship honors in the Central Association. The score of the game was 9 to 0—No. Quincy did not forfeit—and the Keokuk team played an errorless game, not a single player being credited with a mishap.

The game was one which simply served to display the ability of the Keokuk team, both in the field and at bat. Stolen bases came at critical times and base hits were well bunched, which added to nine errors made by Quincey gave the Indians an easy victory.

For the first five innings of the game Jepson worked and held Quincey to a stingy three hits. His work in the box was excellent, his control being good and his judgment praiseworthy. Carroll supplanted him in the sixth inning and for the last four innings of the game went fine, but two hits being made off him. He displayed improved form. For Quincey, Morrow, the tall lad who played first after Forsythe had been benched the day before, was on the mound and Keokuk found his offerings to their liking. The Indians had little difficulty in connecting with his delivery. The heavy slugger of the day was "Red" Corriden, who was able to connect with two two-baggers during his three times at bat. Dean Burton stung the ball for a two bagger also.

Shafer was behind the bat and accepted 11 chances without an error and but two men pilfered a base on him. His arm is still slightly sore. Keokuk did the heavy work in the third and sixth innings when a cluster of hits and Quincey's errors made it possible to send four men across the plate in each session.

"Let me to that phone," said the self-dubbed fish editor.





GOLD MEDAL FLOUR

JUNKIN TRIAL AT CENTERVILLE

Negro Murderer will Be Taken to That City for His Hearing.

Centerville Citizen: John Junkin, the self-confessed negro murderer of Clara Rosen will not have to visit the scene of his heinous crime. The motion filed by Judge J. C. Mitchell, his attorney, for a change of venue, was this morning sustained in a lengthy opinion rendered by Judge C. W. Vermillion, who found that the court must recognize the showing made and the lack of a counter showing that would justify the trial not being removed to some other county in the second judicial district. The court ruled that the case should be heard in the court farthest removed from the location of the "excitement and public prejudice," upon which grounds the motion was sustained, and therefore the trial will go to Centerville in Appanoose county.

Judge M. A. Roberts, of this city who is the presiding judge during the April term, will hear the trial, and owing to the fact that the court demands that certified copies of all papers filed in the case from the return of the indictment to date, be transferred to the county of hearing the trial will not be heard for some time. County Attorney Seneca Cornell, stated this morning that he would prosecute the case, as he felt it a duty he owes to the county of Wapello to do so.

Mr. Cornell will communicate with Judge Roberts immediately after the papers are filed with the clerk of the Appanoose county court, and will make an endeavor to hurry the trial as much as possible. Judge Mitchell, appearing for the defendant, stated that he would not resist a hurried trial, but that he did not think all concerned would be prepared before the latter part of next month.

Despite his aversion to the inflicting of capital punishment; County Attorney Seneca Cornell, recognizing in the evidence presented to the grand jury, that the murder of Miss Rosen was a most revolting crime, will ask the jury in the case to return a verdict of death by hanging. The decision of the county attorney in trying the case, which is not required of him by the laws of Iowa, but instead devolves upon the prosecutor of the county in which it is tried, was made certain through his own conviction that he is better qualified to represent the state than another attorney who has not followed the case in the same diligent and careful manner as himself.
