

FRATERNITIES IN OUR HIGH SCHOOLS

Magazine of the Phi Lambda Epsilon Fraternity Contains Editorial Which is of General Interest.

PLACED IN WRONG LIGHT

School Boards do Not Understand Purpose of Fraternity Because of the Secrets of Organization.

The Phi Lambda Epsilon magazine contains an editorial which advances some of the fraternities arguments in favor of the life of the society in our high schools. It speaks of the school boards being unable to understand the purpose of a fraternity because of the secrecy of the organization and also of some of the mistaken attitudes of both parties. The articles is as follows:

The opposition of school boards to the high school fraternity is a movement which has been growing for the past few years, until it has spread over the whole country. It has been discussed in varying degrees of intensity in almost every school where a chapter of a fraternity exists. It has resulted in producing, not a solution to the problem, but a more complex nature of it, and this has been due in a great part to the mistaken attitude of both parties. The school boards have been unable to get at the purpose of the fraternity, because the fraternity is secret, and consequently the members of the school boards have decided upon numerous things which they have exploited as objections to fraternities in high schools. Their errors have resulted from ignorance of the subject which they have discussed, and a too hasty action based upon this ignorance.

On the other hand, the fraternities have resented this action, and justly so, because it has placed them in a wrong light; but this protection of their own interests has been done in such a way that antagonism has sprung up. This has served to widen the breach until both parties have denied themselves the opportunity to become better acquainted with each other. Until a more perfect understanding has been reached between the general public and the fraternities, no settlement is possible.

The causes for the rise in the fraternity opposition movement can easily be seen if it is viewed from an unbiased standpoint. While it is based on error, the foundation for this error can be traced, not to all fraternities, but to some fraternities the members of which have a doubtful standing and a questionable record. Here lies the secret of the trouble. So long as the members of a sound, healthy fraternity deport themselves according to the standards held up by their fraternity, there is no serious trouble. When the department of the members changes, then there arises opposition. This occurred when high school fraternities were comparatively young, and it has since been repeated. It has caused a sympathetic wave to pass over the whole country. Where the members of a chapter have stood the test and not been found wanting, this opposition has served to increase their prowess, while on the other hand, their failure to do so has served to vitally injure them and their fraternity, giving the opposers one more weapon to use. You can see, then, the necessity for proper conduct, both for your own good and for that of your fraternity.

The plea has been raised that the fraternity interferes with school work. While this might be so, there is no possible excuse for such results. Remember your vow to "advance our school." Your record helps to make or mar the record of your school. You should be moved to work, not shirk. If you ever have trouble in your school, your record as a conscientious pupil, not necessarily a brilliant student, will stand as the best recommendation you can have.

Much weight is given, by the opposition to the accusation that fraternities control the elections in schools, placing fraternity and sorority members in office regardless of their ability or worthiness. This has never been, nor will it ever be, endorsed by the Fraternity. It is contrary to the best interests of both school and Fraternity, which you have promised to uphold. Stand for the man whom you think is best suited for the place, and if he should be a brother, congratulate yourself.

[Heinrich Conreid, the opera impresario, who died in Meran, Austrian Tyrol, was born in Bielitz, Austria, in 1855 and began life as a weaver's apprentice. He had a thirst for drama, however, and at the age of eighteen entered the profession in Vienna. He soon became famous for his ability as a stage manager and in 1878 came to America and acted as stage manager in several German playhouses in New York. His work attracted the attention of Rudolph Aronson, who engaged him to stage musical plays at the Casino. Again his success attracted attention, and he was placed in charge of the Irving Place theater, where for years he staged and managed the best German productions seen in this country. Upon the death of Maurice Grau Mr. Conreid was called to the management of the Metropolitan opera house. His greatest achievements there were the productions of "Parsifal" and "Salome." He resigned because of falling health a year ago.]


