BALLOTS ARE BEING COUNTED

First and Second Ward Disputed Votes Have Been Examined by the Members of the City Council.

A HARMONIOUS MEETING

Third Night's Session of the Contest Board Adjourned to Meet Again This Evening at 7:30.

Everything ran along smoothly last evening in the session of the city council sitting as a tribunal to hear the election contest. The disputed ballots were produced and those from the first and second wards were passed around among the aldermen, the objections to each one being stated by the attorneys and a record made of them.

When the ballots were first investigated there were 268 which were disputed, 124 for Sterne and 145 for Off, but last evening the attorneys on both sides waived a number of these, so that the total of disputed ballots will fall short of 269 before the investigation is finished.

The method being employed is for Mr. Miller to take up the ballots which he has objected to and stating his objections to each one. These ballots are then passed to the aldermen. Mr. Craig then takes the ones which he has disputed, gives his objections and passes them to the aldermen.

The ballots are looked at by each alderman and then the next ward is taken up. Each ballot is marked by the short hand reporter as an exhibit in the case.

The Disputed Ballots.

The objections are about the same in each case, both sides objecting to ballots which are not marked properly, both sides filing objections to red marks, straight lines, double crosses and all such marks of identification which are not crosses in the squares.

As an example, the exhibits in the first ward of the votes counted for Off which are objected to; here is the complete list:

- 1a—Check mark in square instead of cross.
- 1b—Figure 9 opposite Off's name.
- 1c—Figure 69 on the ballot.
- 1d—Cross outside of square.
- 1e—Double marks in square instead of cross.

- 1f—No cross in square.
- 1g—J. A. Henneman's name erased.
- 1h—No cross in square and no initial on back.

The objections to the ballots counted for Mr. Sterne are for similar reasons. In one the name of Kesselring was scratched out. In one there are two crosses for Kenney. In one there is a red cross for Sterne, but black crosses for the others. There are two ballots containing figures.

In the first ward Mr. Miller withdrew five objections and Mr. Craig withdrew five. In the second ward Mr. Miller waived four objections and so did Mr. Craig.

The ballots are passed through the hands of the aldermen in the following order: Hickey, Annable, Swanson, Lindstrand, Christy, Tigie, Johnson, McCormick, DeYoung, Kiefer and Brown.

Details of Meeting.

All aldermen were present last evening when the meeting was called to order by Mayor pro tem Brown, but the audience had thinned out considerably and there were but few spectators present.

The tin box containing the ballots was brought in and Mr. Moore was asked a number of questions regarding its lock. He said that it was possible for the knot in the string to be untied and the box unlocked and opened without the seal being broken. He said that it had not been unlocked since he sealed it.

The box was opened and the report of Blood and Henneman was taken out and identified by Mr. Henneman who was present and who read the totals. It was agreed that the undisputed ballots should not be taken out and the disputed ones for the first ward were then produced and taken from the envelopes by the clerk.

Mr. Craig filed objections to the producing of the ballots. The ballots were taken out and Mr. Miller took the fifteen from the first ward which he had protested, read the protests and the bunch was started around. He withdrew five of them.

Mr. Craig then took his bunch of thirteen ballots and withdrew five of them, stating his objections to eight and passing them around.

After the first ward ballots had been examined by the council J. I. Annable and O. A. Talbot were sworn as witnesses and testified that they had been judges in the first ward on election night. Mr. Annable stated that he had initiated a number of ballots with the letter A and Mr. Talbot said that he had been responsible for putting the figures on a number of ballots while

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they were counting them. He explained that there was no paper for memorandums and he had marked the figures on the top ballots in piles during the count, this having been customary for years.

Mr. Craig entered objections to all of this testimony.

The Second Ward.

The second ward ballots were then produced.

There were 2 challenged votes, 2 spoiled ballots, 12 disputed ones counted for Sterne and 26 disputed ones counted for Off. Each side waived four ballots, leaving 22 disputed Off ballots and 8 disputed Sterne ballots, besides one which had been marked spoiled and which was claimed should have been counted for Sterne.

Here is the markings on the 24 votes counted for Off, which are claimed should not be counted:

- 2a—Line in front of Sterne, besides cross for Off.
- 2b—Half a dozen marks in Off square.
- 2c—Double mark in Kenney square.
- 2d—Same with no cross in square for Tigie.
- 2e—Several marks in Tigie and Kenney squares.
- 2f—Double marks in Off and Kenney squares.
- 2g—Double marks in Tigie square.
- 2h—Long double marks in squares.
- 2i—Double marks for Off.
- 2j—Double marks for Kesselring.
- 2k—Improper mark in Kenney square.

- 2m—All crosses outside of squares.
- 2n—Straight mark in Off square.
- 2o—Same.
- 2p—Same.
- 2q—Double marks.
- 2r—Long marks through squares.
- 2s—Straight marks.
- 2t—Double mark for Kenney.
- 2u—Same.
- 2v—Cross outside of Off square.
- 2w—Red mark in Off square.

In the second ward was one ballot in which the independent and democratic names had been scratched out, also seven others objected to by Mr. Craig, containing double squares.

Adjourned Till Tonight.

At the completion of the examination of the ballots from the second ward, adjournment was taken until 7:30 o'clock this evening, the hour being ten at that time.

Providing a little more speed is made this evening, all of the disputed ballots will have passed through the hands of the aldermen this evening and arguments will come up later.
