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**CARL ROCKENBACH CALLED BEYOND**  
Old Time Citizen of Keokuk Passed Away Shortly After 10 o'clock This Morning at Advanced Age.

Nothing Gave Him More Pleasure Than a Trip Through the Woods and He Was a Lover of Birds.

This morning at 1:05 Carl Rockenbach, an old and respected citizen of Keokuk, residing at 1825 Main st., passed to the Great Beyond after a long and useful life.  
He has been suffering from various ailments incident to old age for several years, the immediate cause of his death being dropsy.  
He was born in Prussia, Germany, May 22, 1830, coming to New York when about sixteen years of age. He was married at Williamsburg, New York, Nov. 16, 1850, to Margaret Geisler, who survives him, as do also the following children: Mrs. R. H. Burns, and Mrs. S. P. Burns of New Haven, Conn.; Mrs. Chas. Hurley of Pekin, Ill.; Mrs. Chas. Reynolds, Mrs. Webster VanAusdall and Mrs. Chas. Nagel, of Keokuk and sons, Rudolph and Fred of Keokuk and Charlie of Hannibal, Mo. Also one sister, Mrs. Matilda Roos of Keokuk, and twenty-five grand children.  
In 1855 he with his family left New York, coming to Keokuk where he has lived ever since with the exception of a few years spent in Hannibal, Mo.  
He has been an upholsterer from the time of his coming to this country, being an excellent and skillful workman in that line, giving it up when forced to do so by failing strength.  
He has always been a lover of birds and was also one of the greatest hunters around here, nothing giving him more pleasure than a trip through the woods with a good dog, and gun. He was a good man, kind and just and will be greatly missed by his relatives and many old friends.
