

**MEMORIAL OF THE WOODMEN**

Keokuk Camp No. 622 Held Exercises Yesterday Afternoon in Hall in Memory of Departed Neighbors.

**TRUMAN PLANTZ SPOKE**

Committee Decorated the Graves in the Morning and Exercises Were Held in the Afternoon.

Keokuk camp No. 622 of the Modern Woodmen of America, observed memorial day yesterday, when the graves of all deceased members of the camp were decorated and appropriate exercises were held. The graves were decorated in the morning by a committee and the exercises were held in the afternoon in Woodman hall, consisting of musical numbers and an address by Hon. Truman Plantz of Warsaw, general attorney of the order. There was a good attendance of the members of the camp and the public. Counsel John P. Johnson called the assemblage to order and the opening

ode of the order was sung by the members of the camp. Prayer was then offered by Rev. J. W. Powers, chaplain of the day and a solo by Mrs. Henry Schouten followed. The address was then given by Mr. Plantz, followed by another selection by Mrs. Schouten, after which the Woodmen honors were given and the exercises were completed.

**A Splendid Address.**  
The address by Mr. Plantz was a splendid one. It was not lengthy but was appropriate and given in the faultless style which has made Mr. Plantz one of the best liked speakers. He spoke of the wonderful growth of the Modern Woodmen and the great benevolent work it is engaged in by protecting the widows and orphans of thousands of men. **FARMERS HAVE BEGUN PLOWING**

Pilot Hugh McKenzie of the Steamer Keokuk Reports Seeing Them Busily Working the Soil.

**A LAUNCH WAS ON FIRE**

The First Excursion of the Steamer Was Due to Leave This Port at 2:30 This Afternoon.

Pilot Hugh McKenzie of the steamer Keokuk of the Carnival City packet company who handles the wheel on the local packet from this city to Quincy, reports that the river is falling fast between this place and the Gem City. In an interview last evening with the river pilot, he said: "The water is falling very fast. The farmers are all out along the shores and are busy now with their belated spring plowing. All along the river on both sides the farmers are working from sun up until too dark to see, in the fields, from Fox river down. "Fish are reported plentiful at Piper and there is very good fishing across from Canton." "The water has not fallen low enough yet to cause the packet any trouble in making good time and the boat arrives

each evening shortly after eight o'clock after a good days trip down and back. The steamer Wenona is also experiencing good runs at present.

**First Excursion.**

The first river excursion of the season left this port at 2:30 this afternoon for Ft. Madison on the steamer W. W. The boat has recently arrived from southern waters where during the past winters it has been running excursions. The boat went down stream about two months ago on its way to the Illinois river where it has been running excursions. The steamer J. S. now enroute from New Orleans to her home port will arrive in Rock Island on June first or about that date. The boat which is the largest in the excursion business on the Mississippi will be seen again in the local port carrying excursions this year. Captain D. W. Wisner of the Acme packet company, which line includes the W. W. and J. S. was in the city yesterday to appoint a local agent for the boat.

**Launch Affire.**

A good substantial little pleasure launch, the property of Orville Publsky and George Selbert caught fire about nine o'clock last evening at its landing on the river front and for a time it looked as though the craft was doomed to the flames. Had not Mr. Publsky single handed rocked the boat sufficiently to send the water over the side of the boat and sunk the craft. The boat had just landed and the engine had been pumped out when in some unknown manner the gasoline from the tank ran into the bottom of the boat and became instantly ignited from the spark plug. The flames leaped up and a number of men standing by took to their heels, thinking that the seven gallons of gasoline which were in the tank at the time would explode from the flames that had caught the bottom of the boat. All but Publsky made their get

away and he tried to smother the flames with a large piece of canvas but this failing, the boat was sunk. The loss of the boat will amount about twenty-five or thirty dollars of repairs. The launch was raised about 9:30 and pumped out and will again be put in shape after the insurance adjusters have looked her over.
