

HELD UP BY MASKED MEN

Frank Singleton Relieved of Ten Dollars Early This Morning at Dark Spot on Bank Street.

THE MEN WORE MASKS

Four Strange Negroes Were Arrested This Morning on Suspicion and Have Been Locked up.

At an early hour this morning, Frank Singleton was held up by two masked men and relieved of ten dollars in money.

He was unable to secure a good look at the men on account of the darkness but saw that they both wore masks over their faces. He was unable to tell whether they were white or colored men.

The police station was notified and a search was made by the night force, but no suspicious characters were found.

Four Negroes Arrested.

This morning four strange negroes were picked up by officers Pearson and Holliday and deputy Marshal Monogue and locked up on suspicion, but none of them had any money when searched at the station.

They gave their names as Wm. Harvey, George Martin, Ed. Campbell and Charles Coleman. Two of them were picked up at Second and Johnson and the other two were arrested down near the cereal plant.

Harvey and Coleman say their homes are in Kansas City and that they came from Fort Madison last evening. The other two give their residences as at Hannibal and say that they came to Keokuk last night from Burlington.

Engine Tank Jumped the Track South of Here and Much Delay Was Caused in Replacing It.

WITH THE RAILROADERS

Paymaster Out Over the K. & W. in Special Car This Morning—Woodin is in the City.

William Howard, the man who was injured by striking his head against the boiler head on Monday night in the collision between the switch train and engine No. 141 of the K. & W. is reported getting along nicely and his injuries are said not to be so dangerous as were first expected. No. 141 the engine which was pretty badly damaged in the collision has been taken to Hannibal for repairs and a new engine has been put on for the run between this city and Centerville.

Paymaster on K. & W.

The paymaster arrived in the city this morning from Chicago and left on the special at eight o'clock over the K. and W. for Shenandoah to deliver the checks of employees on that road. The men on the Hannibal division received their pay on the 15th. The task of paying off the employees of the Q. is allotted to one man and is no small task. Headquarters are in Chicago and some times more than a month is required of the paymaster to be on the road.

Woodin Here.

W. W. Woodin, roadmaster of the Hannibal division and Syl McIntyre, clerk in the superintendent's office at Hannibal were in the city this morning, taking measurements for the track on the main line, which is to be raised.

Several car loads of ballast, rock screenings, have been unloaded along the track and will be used when the road bed is raised.

Six Hours Late.

Freight train No. 79 from St. Louis, due to arrive here at 4:52 was almost six hours late this morning, arriving at 10:30. The train was delayed on account of the engine tank having jumped the track.

Beginning with May 25 the rates of passenger fare on the St. Louis & Hannibal railway will be 3 cents per mile when tickets are purchased, and 3 1/2 cents per mile if paid on train. A reduction of 10 per cent will be made on round trip tickets, limited to 30 days.
