
Still at Large—No Clue. Hatch is still at large at 4 o'clock this afternoon and the prison authorities are absolutely without any clue as to the direction the man took.

This morning's Chicago Tribune has the following to say of the death of one of his favorite pacers: BARRINGTON, ILL., May 19.—The pacer Velox, 2:09 1-4, purchased in California last winter for \$28,000 and the star of Dick McMahon's stable at Libertyville track, died today after a mysterious illness of twenty-four hours. The horse suffered intense pain during that time and the veterinarians were wholly unable to diagnose the trouble. A post-mortem will be held tomorrow morning.

Velox worked three easy heats Tuesday, being driven by his owner, W. H. McDoel, president of the Monon railroad. The fastest mile was 2:25 1-2 and the best quarter :35. It was intended to drive the horse one more mile, but while he was being hitched he became restless and soon was in great pain. Remedies for colic and other acute trouble failed to relieve him. Velox had paced miles in 2:05 and was a fine race horse. He was bought for grand circuit races and had been entered wherever possible.

He has met with success and by his hard and conscientious work and pleasant manner has won for himself both a lucrative practice and a wide circle of friends.

Had Many Friends. Hundreds of friends in Keokuk and Burlington extended congratulations to Dr. and Mrs. Yant upon their entrance to wedded life. The bride is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Lambert, formerly of this city and during her residence here enjoyed the friendship of many people both young and old. Her father was for a long time pastor of the Trinity M. E. church of Tenth and Main streets. She has many friends in Burlington also and had the marriage not been kept a secret there would have been hundreds at the train to give the couple a rousing reception.

Dr. Yant Ever Remembered. Even though Dr. Roscoe Yant will not make his future home in Keokuk he will ever be remembered by hundreds of friends and acquaintances in this city. He has been active in society and sporting circles of the city until his departure to Burlington about a year ago. He gained his education in the public schools of the city and was graduated from the Keokuk high school and Keokuk Dental College. In high school circles he was one of the most widely known athletes who ever donned the purple and white and his name has ever been revered by those who have come to take his place. He was a member of almost every athletic team and was the star half back of the football team of 1902, which had only one rival and that was the football team of 1906. In college circles he was also prominent and made many friends among the student.

For two summers Dr. Yant was a member of the Keokuk baseball team and during his baseball career was regarded as one of shining lights of the Central Association and among the leading fielders in the league. He also played one season with the Burlington club and had he chosen to follow the profession of a ball player he might have gone up much higher than anything offered in the Central Association.
