PAYING PENALTY FOR HIS CRIME

Murderer Junkin Shivers in Torment in Centerville Jail and Suffers Great Mental Agony.

HIS TRIAL BEGINS TODAY

Every Precaution Has Been Taken to Avoid a Mob Swooping Down and Lynching Negro Brute.

John Junkin, the negro brute who murdered Miss Rosen at Ottumwa, is already paying the penalty for his crime, shivering in torment and agony in his cell at Centerville and suffering great mental agony in his fears of a lynching here. His trial was to start today in Centerville.

The following from Centerville tells of the brute's fear:

"They'll never crack my neck," was the statement made by John Junkin in his steel cage at the jail here, where he awaits the beginning of his trial Tuesday. He has brooded over a mob scene in which he is the central figure, till asleep or awake he is in mortal agony and trembles at the slightest unusual sound. He has made up his mind that no mob shall have him for torture till he has made a desperate attempt to end his own life. His guards say he is so near a nervous collapse that he would not have the courage to take his own life, but would find an easy prey to any mob that might try to take him so far as his own resistance went.

County Physician J. P. Neely had to be called to attend him to prevent his total breakdown and collapse which make it necessary to carry him to the court room for trial. He is suffering from a stomach disorder, brought on, so the physician says, by his nervousness, lack of sleep, and failure to eat his meals properly. After restoratives were applied he felt better.

Heavily armed guards are at the jail night and day. Many visitors ask to see him, but now all are refused for fear injury might be done him, or some one might hand him a weapon or poison. The few visitors that were admitted started him so that he could talk with difficulty. He would dodge into his bunk cover in a corner of the cage, and his eyes would roll as he trembled and shook. Since all visitors have been refused he is becoming more pacified. He observed that the jail was an old one and not secure looking. It is down in a hollow, two blocks from the square, with barns and other buildings around it, which would easily hide the approach of a mob. All these things have been noted by him with the greatest apprehension.

Officers Confident. William Bray, ex-sheriff and captain of the guards, has everything well organized. It would be a most difficult matter for a mob to form in Centerville, or suspicious persons to approach from several miles outside without his sentinels sending in a report. The officers do not profess much confidence in their being able to save the negro should a mob appear at the jail, but they are relying on strategy and their organization to save him. Should a mob appear it is very doubtful whether they would find Junkin in the jail after they had forced the doors. Sheriff Clark, who professed considerable concern when Junkin was placed in his hands entirely unaware, now believes the situation is in hand and no violence will result. When Sheriff Jackson, of Ottumwa, called at the jail with the prisoner early Friday morning was the first Sheriff Clark knew he had been taken outside the penitentiary walls. So it is probable the trial will be public and all strangers searched by officers as they enter the court room.
