

"LAMBDA" ON LONG CRUISE

Earl Phillips and Chester Westcott Were Due to Leave Today For a Six Hundred Mile Trip.

UP THE ILLINOIS RIVER

Voyage Will Require About Ten Days and Will be Made For Pleasure by the Young Men.

Earl Phillips and Chester Westcott left the first lock of the government canal this afternoon in the former's launch, the "Lambda" on a trip down the Mississippi, thence up the Illinois from Grafton to the Hennepin canal.

This is a six hundred mile trip by motor boat and will no doubt prove a very enjoyable one for the two young men as it is being made for pleasure's sake alone and will require about ten days to make the trip above given.

The launch Lambda in which the run is to be made is a staunch little craft and will easily accommodate the two pleasure seekers on their voyage.

The launch was built by Phillips at the second lock shops and is about twenty feet in length. A 5 horse power engine will furnish motive power for the boat and the two expect to make about twelve miles an hour during the entire journey.

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NEGRO TRAVELER FROM ARKANSAS

Isaac Goodman Came North to Look For Work and Was Picked up by the Police While Asking For a Job.

HE WAS SCARED WHITE

The Renowned Jerry Moore Was in Court Again This Morning For Falling From the Water Wagon.

Coming from the lumber camps of Arkansas, where he worked eleven hours each day for \$1.25 per day, Isaac Goodman, a southern negro who had never been north of Mason and Dixon's line, landed in Keokuk during the night and this morning when he asked for work, was taken to the police station and locked up for the first time in his life.

Black as coal, he was almost scared white by the experience, which was something new to him. He was up in the superior court this morning charged with having no visible means of support and there were tears in his eyes while he was in custody. He was sentenced to ten days in the city jail and will be kept there for a couple of days to help clean up the place and will then likely be sent out of town.

He told the court this morning that he had been working for a lumber company in Arkansas for \$1.25 per day of eleven hours and hearing that work was plentiful and well paid in the north, started up the river.

He paid his way on the boat until he had but fifteen cents left and then walked into Keokuk. Stopping this morning where the men were laying brick on Main street, he asked for a job. A big man said "I'll give you a job." And he followed him, being taken to the police station and locked up.

Other Court Matters. Besides this man, Sam Davis was up in the superior court this morning, on the charge of wife desertion.

Through an attorney, he entered a plea of not guilty and asked for a change of venue, his bond being fixed at \$300 and the case being transferred to the court of Justice Landes. The renowned Jerry Moore, who within the past year has been arrested more times for being drunk than any other one man, was up in court and was fined \$1 and costs. His brother Martin Moore also appeared and got the same fine.

Jerry was arrested Saturday night and released to appear this morning. Shortly after he left the station, the officers brought in his brother. Both men gave orders on their employers for the amount due the court. Jerry was back in jail before noon.

Four men were arrested on warrants charging them with conducting a bucket shop. After being arrested, the men were lined against a wall, and the constables, with axes, wrecked the place and the furniture. Vans carried away the confiscated books, money and records to the court house. Hunt declares he has captured the headquarters of a great bucket system that has lately been involved in the United States court trials.

After Being an Invalid For Sixteen Years, Death Relieved Him of His Sufferings.

After sixteen years an invalid, Samuel Allen passed away this morning at 9:30 o'clock at the family home, No. 126 North Fourth street, sinking into a peaceful sleep. Mr. Allen's death came rather suddenly for he had not complained of feeling any worse than usual. He had just finished partaking of a cup of coffee and as the nurse was removing the dishes, he gave several gasps and sank into a peaceful and eternal sleep. His daughter was absent from the city at the time, being on a three days visit with her mother, who is likewise an invalid in a hospital. She left Friday and intended to return this evening. She was notified by telephone to be sure and come home this evening, but was not informed that her father had passed away and will arrive this evening. Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Buchanan went to Burlington to meet Miss Allen and inform her on the way down this evening of the sad death.

The many friends of the family took possession of the house today and there were many callers, expressing sympathy.

Mr. Allen was a well known railroad man in Keokuk years ago, being agent here for the Wabash. He was a Mason and had a great many friends. Owing to the absence of the daughter from the city a biographical notice could not be secured today, nor could the funeral arrangements be made.
