



THE POLLUTION OF THE RIVERS

Uncle Sam Cannot Stop us From Dumping Our Sewage Into the Rivers.

Burlington Gazette: "We find that the United States government has no power to restrain cities along internal waterways from dumping their sewage into streams from which the cities get their water supply," says Dr. Moerke, who returned to the city last evening from Washington, D. C., where he attended the convention of the state and provincial boards of health and the marine hospital service. He was the official delegate from the Iowa board of health.

Dr. Moerke as chairman of the committee presented a paper dealing with the pollution of streams from which cities draw their water supply. An opinion was rendered by the attorney general to the effect that the national government has no control over the interior waterways other than that of navigation. The states have all the power to regulate matters such as fishing, dumping of sewage, etc. Therefore no action by the government can effect such cities as Burlington, Davenport, Muscatine, Dubuque, St. Louis and others which are daily dumping greater quantities of poisonous matter into the Mississippi river for the towns farther down stream to draw in with their water supply.

"It will require action by the bordering states before the pollution of streams can be restrained," says Dr. Moerke. "As the years go on and the cities increase in size, the need of controlling this is becoming more necessary. I think the time is not far off when the states will take action. The septic tank is the solution of the problem. Cities like Burlington can install these tanks in the sewers at all points where branches open into the main sewers, and by this means all vegetable matter will be destroyed and the stream which will finally reach the river will be pure instead of poisonous. The cost will not be great, either. "It is up to each state to take up this matter individually, and the representatives present at the Washington convention will present it at the next meeting of the legislatures in their states."
