

**OIL INSPECTORS HAVE BEEN NAMED**

Fort Madison Man is Appointed as the Inspector For the First Congressional District of Iowa.

EFFECTIVE ON JULY 1ST

A Number of Keokuk Men Were Applicants For the Position and One May Get a Deputyship.

Governor Carroll has made his appointments of oil inspectors and a number of Keokuk men who had applied for the position as inspector for this congressional district, were not appointed, but one of them may get a deputyship.

For the first district, W. D. Masters of Fort Madison has been named, the Fort Madison Democrat saying: W. D. Masters has received word from Governor Carroll that he has been selected by the governor for the office of state oil inspector in this

congressional district, comprising the seven counties of Lee, Des Moines, Louisa, Washington, Jefferson, Henry and Van Buren counties. The commission issues today, but the appointment will not be effective until July 1st.

Mr. Masters is one of the original Carroll men in Lee county and is a friend of Iowa's present governor since their boyhood. Both were born in Union township, Davis county.

Mr. Masters has been a resident of Fort Madison for twenty-four years and has been a guard at the penitentiary while living here except for five years, when he was on the city police force. He is an old soldier, popular with all our citizens, and his appointment will be learned of with pleasure by his many friends.

The Complete List. The complete list of appointments, according to a Des Moines paper is as follows:

Gov. B. F. Carroll today confirmed his announcement of five weeks ago that former Adjutant General M. H. Byers was to be appointed chief oil inspector to succeed Capt. Hugh M. Pickel and also named thirteen assistant oil inspectors who are to serve under Byers.

Four of the present inspectors are reappointed. These are J. P. Risley of Davenport, H. V. Speers of Marshalltown, Thomas Chantland of Badger and C. W. Kent of Orange City. The other nine assistant inspectors, who will begin work July 1, are as follows:

W. D. Masters, of Fort Madison; R. M. Garrison, of Cedar Rapids; W. B. Cowan, of Waukon; S. B. Humbert, of Cedar Falls; Cornelius Van Note, of

Mason City; John L. Richardson, of Denison; Theodore Guttar, of Council Bluffs; John W. Hall of Osceola, and J. P. Early of Albia.

The following men were not reappointed: Charles S. Rogers, of Mount Pleasant; Leroy Burch, of Cedar Rapids; C. H. Tallmadge, of West Union; Robert A. Santee, of Cedar Falls; Francis M. Gregory, of Mason City; L. G. Bangs of Carroll; L. B. M. Cousins, of Council Bluffs; A. E. Holland, of Creston and W. C. Jacobs of Knoxville.

The compensation of chief inspector is \$150 a month and of assistant inspectors \$100 a month. The state is divided into fourteen districts, each in charge of an inspector.

**IOWA LAWS TO BE ENFORCED.**

New Pharmacy Statutes to be Given Special Attention.

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 14.—Strict and absolutely impartial enforcement of the laws of the state is the order under the present state

administration, and especially is this true with relation to the new pharmacy laws of the state.

Very soon the druggists will have to begin getting their liquor application blanks from the county auditors in such way that an absolute record will be kept, and there can be no evasion of the law. The new pharmacy board will be very strict in regard to the literal observance of this new law, which is regarded by the progressive druggists as tending to protection of themselves and the public. Another law whose enforcement involves immediately upon the new board is that which was passed in 1907 to "prevent the adulteration, misbranding and imitation of drugs."

To Educate Druggists.

This very important law had a provision that all goods placed in stock prior to July 1, 1907, were exempt until April 1, 1909. Inasmuch as it would be difficult for the state to show that a misbranded article had been placed in stock at any specific time practically nothing could be done toward enforcement of the law until April 1 of this year. As a matter of fact the old board had put in a vast amount of time in a process of educating the pharmacists of the state as to this law and laying the foundation for observance of its letter and its spirit, and this work was one reason for the unusual activity of the old board the past two years. But just at the time when enforcement was to be commenced the old board was made the victim of political necessities. It is known, however, that the new board is in favor of strict enforcement of the law and preparations are under way for the prosecution of every druggist in the state who violates the law.

To Curb Drug Habits.

The enforcement of this law will place Iowa in line with other states in the matter of reform in the handling of drugs. It will go far toward putting an end to the evil of the drug habit.
