—At the meeting this evening of Morning Star Lodge No. 5, Knights of Pythias, two candidates will be given the Esquire rank work.
—Martin Moore, who was fined Monday morning for being drunk, was picked up again during the day in the same condition and kept locked up over night to sober up.
—The annual United Presbyterian church picnic at Wild Cat was enjoyed by both the young and old members of the church. Those who attended went over this morning on the interurban and then took excursion cars to the grounds.

—Pure food agitation is going to eventually settle down to the question of sanitation, says State Food and Dairy Commissioner Wright. "The pure food laws have done marvels in bringing about purer food. The work of the department is growing smaller all the time with reference to detecting harmful preservatives and the like in foods. One of the chief developments will be in inspecting foods to prevent dirt. We will probably in the future secure more stringent laws along this line. I am sure we will when the people awaken to a consideration of what they really are eating. What we need is a law covering methods employed in bakeries, meat markets, etc., and the wagons used to deliver the goods. I have seen deliverymen wipe the perspiration from their face on their coat sleeve and then load up the same arm with bread that was to be sold and served on the table. New York has some stringent laws on management and operation of such places. Iowa will have them, but the advancement cannot be made at once. People are demanding purer, cleaner food. They will get more stringent laws as they realize conditions existing."

—A marriage license was issued this morning to Raymond A. Westcott aged 22 years, of Oelwein and Ella Estes Vermillion, aged 22 years, of Keokuk, who are to be married tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock at the home of the bride.
—The Quincy Whig of this morning says of the Unitarian excursion yesterday: The largest excursion of the season arrived here yesterday on the steamer "J. S." from Keokuk, bringing fully a thousand people. It was given under the auspices of the ladies of the Unitarian church of that city. The boat, which is among the most commodious on the river for such purposes, arrived at 11:30 a. m. and its human cargo spread over the city, visiting the various places of interest and amusement. The excursionists were so numerous on some streets that they were quite conspicuous. A party of 75 took dinner at the cafe of the Y. W. C. A. on Fourth street. Prominent among those who came down were S. W. Wakefield, at one time master mechanic of the Keokuk and Des Moines division of the Rock Island; Dr. J. M. Shaffer, who was once in charge of the state asylum at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa; W. J. Roberts, an attorney; Colonel Aus. Hollowell, wife and daughter. The colonel presented a live eagle to the S. and S. home at the time of its dedication. The steamer left at 4:30 p. m. for the return trip to Keokuk.
—The weather crop bulletin for the state of Iowa for the week ending June 13, has just been issued from Des Moines and is as follows: The temperature was below the normal for the week, with an excess of rainfall over the larger part of the state and a decided deficiency of sunshine. During the first three days of the week showers were general and in a few localities very heavy and damaging. Bottom lands were flooded and in places where the rainfall was the heaviest hillside lands were badly washed. If the rain continues a few days longer some of the acreage intended for corn will have to be abandoned and used for some later crop. Field work was practically impossible until Friday and then only in the most favored localities. As a result weeds and grass are getting a good start and many fields are foul. But in spite of the adverse conditions and the lack of cultivation, corn on uplands and well drained ground, comprising the larger percentage of the corn acreage, shows a good color and is growing rapidly. The soil is still in fine condition and with a few days of favorable weather the fields would be cleaned and the condition of the crop decidedly improved. All reports indicate that grass, small grain, potatoes and garden truck have made rapid growth and give promise of abundant yields.
