

NAMED ROBERTS AND HENDERSON

Republicans Select Good Candidates For A. J. Jerm in the Fourth and the Sixth Precincts.

FOR SPECIAL ELECTION

Primaries Were Held Last Evening and Candidates Named to Fill Vacancies in the Council.

For alderman Fourth ward—H. T. Henderson.
For alderman sixth ward—J. R. Roberts.

The republicans of the fourth and sixth wards met last evening for the purpose of selecting candidates for aldermen in these two wards to be voted on at the special election on July 1, to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of Charles Off and W. Frank Brown. The above two were named and as usual with republican nominees, both represent the very highest type of citizens and worthy in every manner to represent the citizens in the city council.

Mr. Henderson is a Keokuk manufacturer, a long time business man of the city with a stainless record. He bears the confidence and good will of all and is fully qualified in every way to serve his ward as alderman.

Mr. Roberts is known by everyone in his ward and by a majority of the citizens in the other wards. He possesses, also, all of the qualities necessary to make a councilman who will look after the city's interests and is deserving of all the support which can be given him.

He was the republican candidate in this ward at the spring election and would probably have been elected had it not been for the independent ticket in the field, the vote resulting: Kiefer, 372; Roberts, 301; Loewenstein, 139.

Both wards are to be congratulated upon the excellent selections made last evening.

The Fourth Ward.
The fourth ward primaries were held in the building, No. 222 B street and although the crowd was not large, there was much enthusiasm and a spirit of determination. J. E. Mitchell called the meeting to order and Samuel Daughters was made the chairman with Dan Gamble as secretary.

The purpose of the meeting was stated and H. T. Henderson was nominated by acclamation, upon motion of Dan Gamble.

The chairman predicted that Mr. Henderson would be elected if the members of the party in the ward would do their duty and declared that the prospects never looked brighter in the ward for the election of a candidate. He said that Mr. Henderson would be a credit to his ward, if elected.

Mr. Henderson made a brief address, thanking the meeting for the honor bestowed upon him and the meeting then adjourned.

The Sixth Ward.
In the sixth ward primaries which were held in Schouten's hall, two ballots were necessary on account of a mistake made by some one who cast too many ballots, more votes being cast than there were men in the hall.

George S. Merriam called the meeting to order and Harvey Beech was made the chairman with Ed. S. Lofton as secretary.

The object of the meeting was stated and James R. Roberts was nominated by John Ferris. William Patterson was nominated by E. S. Jones.

The chairman appointed George S. Merriam and Thomas Tighe as tellers and the ballots were gathered up. When counted the votes stood: Roberts, 19; Patterson, 23.

There were but 36 men in the hall at the time, so that a total vote of 42 was wrong and upon motion a second ballot was taken, this time the voters

passing up to the table. The second ballot was correct and resulted: Roberts, 20; Patterson, 16.

Mr. Roberts was declared the nominee and upon being called for, expressed thanks and hoped to be able to land the ticket. He said that in case the commission plan was not adopted, it was very important to Keokuk that both the fourth and sixth wards elected republican and promised to do his duty if elected, but would make no promises now.

EGYPT AND ITALY WERE VISITED

A Very Interesting and Pleasant Evening For Large Number Who Heard Rev. Potter Last Night.

THE ROBERTS COLLEGE

Opinion is Unanimous That This College Had an Uplifting Effect on Its 400 Students Who Figured in Uprising.

The large auditorium of the Trinity M. E. church was comfortably filled last evening, with those who heard the interesting lecture on "Egypt and Italy" by Rev. J. W. Potter.

A large screen was stretched across the auditorium on which interesting views taken by Rev. Potter and party on their trip to the Egyptian and Italian countries, were thrown. Fifty interesting views were shown and with each an interesting description of the scene on the canvas was given by the speaker. Little anecdotes and highly interesting stories of the Orient, made a very pleasant hour for the two hundred and fifty persons who were present.

The affair was in charge of the Trinity Young Men's class of which C. E. Alling is president and E. W. Pierce, teacher. Mr. Alling had charge of the entertainment and made a brief talk before Dr. Potter's address. In charge of the ushering and admission were Dr. Bradfield, assisted by Messrs. C. H. Benson, Ed. Wustrow, E. E. Eaton, E. E. Walker and J. A. Venatta. In charge of the stereopticon machine were Gerrie Danford and E. W. Pierce assisted by Messrs. A. F. Berger and J. C. Ferris.

The Lecture.

The pictures shown last evening were photographs taken while the party was enroute by steamer to the Orient and while in the eastern world. The slides shown were clear and distinct for all to see and were much more enjoyed by the audience because of this fact.

The first slide, when starting on the trip with Dr. Potter last evening, showed the home of George Washington at Mt. Vernon. The next showed the party which was composed of some eight hundred people at sea on the ocean liner. Several storm pictures while at sea were shown. Then came an interesting series of pictures showing street scenes in Algiers and the governor's palace.

A slide on which was the large steam yacht of Thomas Lipton, proved highly interesting. At Constantinople, a picture of Roberts' college was shown and Dr. Potter stated that it is now believed that to this American institution can be laid the cause for the uprising of the young Turks recently.

The old, old tree on top of Stromboli at Constantinople where political prisoners for the past several hundred years have been hanged was shown. Thirty Turks were hanged to a limb of this tree in the recent uprising.

In Naples, the beautiful parks, statuary and sculpture works, were shown with remarkable clearness. In Rome, the dome of St. Peter's the Catacombs and styles of architecture figured prominently in the pictures.

In the bay at Alexandria, in Egypt was shown a shipping scene and remarks of the quarantine of these ships on account of the bubonic plague in the city were touched on by the speaker. A photo of the Mayflower, a pleasure excursion boat was shown.

From Alexandria, the party was taken to Cairo. Here were shown several irrigation scenes, the three pyramids, the Cheops, the burying place of the old kings and the Sphinx were shown.

All in all, the talk was very interesting and the hour proved very enjoyable.

KEOKUK BOYS SAW TURKS' UPRISING

An Interesting Letter From a Keokuk Boy on Board the U. S. S. Montana Which Was in Turkey.

DON'T WEAR ANY SHOES

A Short Story in a Letter of Several Thousand Miles Travel in Foreign Lands Aboard a Battleship.

Letters from Keokuk boys who are in the U. S. navy or army always prove very interesting to friends in this city and especially so when the travels and little incidents in the every day life of the sailor boy are depicted in the letters received at home.

There are quite a number of Keokuk boys in the navy, all of whom are doing well and say they would not change places with a landsman for anything.

Following is a letter received in this city by Nelson Burris who corresponds regularly with his friend, Virgil Smith, of the U. S. S. Montana. His experience among the Turks during the recent uprising of the young bloods of the land are told in an interesting manner:
U. S. Montana, Alexandrette, Turkey, May 18, 1909.

"This ship has been traveling some for the past three months. We left Norfolk, Va., March 26th for Guantanamo, Cuba. We were there a couple of days and went to the island of Gondofope. Was there to watch President Castro. When his hip left, we left about a half mile in the rear. We went to Port of France, then to Port of Spain, Trinidad. After a short stay there we left for Gontanama.

Playing Ball.

"We were having a good time, swimming and playing ball when we got orders to go to Turkey. We took on stores and coaled like the deuce. On April 26th, we left Cuba for Gibraltar in company with the North Carolina. That is 3,875 miles. It took eleven days. I guess that is some without a stop.

"May 5th we arrived at the Rock of Gibraltar. Some of the guys were looking for the Prudential sign. Say but that was a grand sight. That rock is honey-combed and there are guns all over the place. It is the strongest fort in the world.

At Messina.

"We coaled and went on our way to Messina, a short distance of 2,000 miles. There were about ten ships of different nations in there. It is a little burg, about the size of Warsaw. We left the Caroline and came up here to Alexandrette. There was an engagement here between a Turkish and an English gunboat. The French send a landing party ashore every day to patrol the town.

"We have got an all summer job here it looks like. The Turks have been killing everybody that they could almost and almost every town in Turkey has been burned. The Turks are in the hills here but the warboats have them bluffed.

"Say I would like to drop in for a couple of cool ones. The weather in this place is fine.

Doesn't Wear Shoes.

"I havn't had shoes on for a week. After 11:30 a. m. we have nothing to do but eat and sleep. We get stow every meal it seems like. I am getting to be a shorter timer now, only two years and a "but" to do. Say I was aboard the U. S. S. Louisiana and saw Dick Levering there. You know him. Faber and Wells were ashore. Coyle, Howe and myself were over there when she was lying along side of us in Norfolk. All of those fellows are paid off this fall.

Will close for this time hoping to hear from you again soon,
