but expressed no opinion as to
whether it was an illegal method of
catching them or not. The pumps will
be kept in order and a supply of fuel
on hand with an engineer in charge.
They can thus be started up at a mo-
ment's notice if the water begins ris-
ing in the district. Their operation
has resulted in the planting of thous-
ands of acres of corn at least a month
earlier than would have been possible
otherwise.

ered the child was under 14 it did
not relieve him from answering for
violating the law. Now, under the
new law he cannot give a minor em-
ployment until he has absolute proof
of age in his hands. So he can de-
mand such of parents before giving
employment and he will accordingly
be fortified with protection against
prosecutions because of misapprehen-
sions.
