

BISHOP CARROLL HERE FROM WEST

Enroute to Archdiocese of Cincinnati, He Will be the Guest of Rev. Thos. O'Reilly For a Few Days.

AN ELOQUENT SPEAKER

Both Catholics and Non-Catholics of the City Will Have an Opportunity of Hearing Him.

Rt. Rev. John P. Carroll, D. D., of Helena, Montana, arrived in Keokuk last evening and will remain for several days.

Bishop Carroll is an eloquent speaker and Keokuk people will have an opportunity of hearing him on several occasions at St. Peter's church.

At the present time Bishop Carroll is quite a notable figure in the Catholic world and is a man whose aggressive tactics and wide awake interest in the country's issues have attracted attention.

Educated in Dubuque.

Bishop Carroll was formerly of this state and gained the greater part of his education at the Catholic college in Dubuque at the time Rev. Thos. O'Reilly was in that city.

"It was extremely difficult for me to leave Helena at the present time," said Bishop Carroll in speaking to a late City representative today.

Praises the School.

Bishop Carroll spoke in the highest terms of praise of the St. Peter's school which has been the result of untiring efforts of Father O'Reilly and ranks it with the leading parochial schools of the country.

He had also time to express a few words of praise for the magnificent work being done by the Knights of Columbus throughout the land and especially of their remarkable growth in educational work.

Bishop Carroll is a most interesting conversationalist and has a personality that attracts with magnetic force.

Before coming to Keokuk he spent a few days at Dubuque and while in Keokuk will be the guest of Rev. Thos. O'Reilly.

KEOKUK MAN ON THE BOARD

John Heineman Elected One of the Committee to Determine "Where and How" to Build German College.

At a meeting on Monday of the German Evangelical churches of this district, John Heineman was elected by the board as a member of the college committee. It is the intention of the churches of the district to erect a college some time soon and Kahoka, Mo., has been one of the strong bidders for the building of such an institution although another town in the district has made a better proposition to the board for building than Kahoka.

The committee will be in session on July first to determine where and how the college will be erected, and to do the preliminary work on the proposition. The committee must have \$60,000 on hand before going ahead with the building. This amount will be raised in a short time, however, and it will then remain for the committee to determine where the college shall be erected.


