

—The monthly weather summary for June, just issued, shows that the past month was a trifle warmer and a trifle damper than usual. There were 11 clear days, 17 cloudy days and ten days when there were thunderstorms. The warmest day was the 24th, at 90, while the coldest day was the 15th at 50. The mean temperature was 73 and the rainfall was 5.11. —When the interurban car reached Third street on the return trip to this city last evening a few minutes after 9 o'clock, L. J. DeBar, a traveling salesman from Cedar Falls, Iowa, signalled for the car to stop, but the motorman started again before he had reached the pavement with his two heavy suit cases. Mr. and Mrs. Dedman in charge. —Ladies' 15c black hose tomorrow only 10c per pair, Central store. —Along with the numerous other improvements being made by the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad W. W. Woodin, north division roadmaster announces that the company is contemplating laying heavier rails between Keokuk and Burlington a distance of thirty-three miles. Work will be started about the middle of July when the present sixty-six pound rails will be taken up and second-hand eighty-pound rails put down in their places. Fifteen miles of track, on the Mount Pleasant branch will also be supplemented with heavier rails, the present fifty-six pound rails giving way to second hand sixty-six pound rails. The company will also distribute two thousand yards of sand ballast on the Mount Pleasant branch. These improvements together with the repairing of a large number of the bridges on the line will put the road in first class condition.
