

THE BURLINGTON REGATTA TODAY

Keokuk Delegation Arrived Last Evening and Secured a Good Place Along the River Front.

RAIN DID NOT INTERFERE

The Big Free For All Race, the Event of the Regatta, is to be Run Late This Afternoon.

[By a Staff Correspondent.] BURLINGTON, July 5.—On board the cruiser Vivian:—In spite of the gloomy aspect this morning, with rain falling and a chilliness in the air, the second annual regatta of the Mississippi Valley Power Boat Association opened with much enthusiasm and interest.

The Keokuk boats arrived last evening after a most enjoyable cruise up the river and after considerable trouble in finding a place to tie up during the regatta, found a good place along the shore.

Burlington is in gala attire, the national colors being used in profusion on the business streets and the display being especially effective along the river front. The rain will not interfere with the race program and the first event, is scheduled to start promptly at 9:15 o'clock when the 32 foot class will start on the 10 mile spurt.

The big race of the day is to be run late this afternoon when the 20 mile free for all championship race will be run.

The course was laid off by Major Meigs and the figures are accurate, so that absolutely correct records of the races will be secured.

The harbor presents an interesting appearance with the many motor boats moored along shore and everybody is friendly and cordial. The crowd of spectators is smaller than expected on account of the weather, but many people are out to witness the speed events.

The Emerson show boat which was at Keokuk last week, is moored here and will stay during the regatta. Young Brothers moving picture show has its tent pitched near the depot. This evening at the opera house a wrestling match will be given and there will be band concerts all day and fire works tonight.

The fire works tonight will be given from a barge anchored in the river opposite the grand stand south of Columbia street, which will seat 1500 people.





WAS HELD IN SUM OF \$800

Louis C. Mulch, of Near Basco, Charged With Sending Obscene Letter to Keokuk Young Women.

Louis C. Mulch, charged with sending obscene letters to young women in Keokuk and other places waived preliminary examination before U. S. Commissioner Martindale at Quincy and is being held under \$800 bond. The Quincy Journal in speaking of the case says:

U. S. Deputy Marshal Grady arrived here this morning, having in custody Louis C. Mulch, aged about 21 years, from near Basco, Ill. The prisoner was taken before U. S. Commissioner Martindale and arraigned on a charge of sending obscene letters to a young lady residing near West Point. Mulch, who comes from a well to do and prominent family, waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the federal grand jury in the sum of \$800, which he promptly furnished. Accompanying Mulch to the city was his attorney, Senator Gibson, of Carthage, who will defend him in the federal court.

The warrant in the case was sworn out by Postoffice Inspector Swift, who has been working on the case for some time and he has gathered together many letters written in the same hand which are about the foulest ever penned. Accompanying some of the letters were pictures of a most outrageous character. These letters will be used as evidence in the federal court, together with such evidence as will be furnished by the postmaster of Warsaw, Miss Olga Satory and other witnesses who will be summoned. Letters written in the same hand were also addressed to young women of Memphis, Mo., Keokuk and other places during the recent past.

Mulch is understood to claim that he is innocent of the charge of mailing the obscene letters.

NOT MANY PEOPLE WENT THIS MORNING

Instead of several hundred people boarding the train for Burlington this morning where the regatta is to be held today, there were only about a hundred amusement seekers who braved the weather and made the trip. If the day had been nice there would undoubtedly have been enough people to go to the races to fill the coaches which the engine pulled out this morning, four extras having been added, which it is doubtful whether they were filled on the way or not.

The Steamer Keokuk which offered special rates for a trip to Quincy, in which place a big celebration was planned, had about fifty on board when she pulled out about eight o'clock.

The depot reminded a person of a relief station for flood sufferers, as many people rushed under the cover of the protecting roof, with the water running off of them in streams. The base ball team left at seven thirty and with their baggage piled up in a heap some of the players themselves a little damp from the rain, a person surely was led to think that they had been rescued from a flooded district somewhere. Any way the rain will do away with the danger of fires largely and give the speed boats plenty of water to run in. As it looked this morning the chances for a game of ball at Burlington are slim and the players evidently had a chance to witness the boat races on the river.




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OFFICERS RAID GAMBLING JOINT

Seven Negroes Arrested Early Sunday Morning for Shooting Craps in Burrows Row.

NEW LAW TO BE TESTED

"Red Light" District Has Been Relieved of Many of its Residents, According to Reports.

Marshal Kesseling, Night Captain Scheevers and Officer Freeman raided a negro gambling joint in Burrows Row Sunday morning at 12:45 o'clock and seven negroes are now lodged in the city jail. The case will be the first one under the new Iowa law regarding gambling and the law will be put to a test. The negroes arrested were the following: Archie Brown, Fred Hayden, Harry Taylor, Lee Anderson, Roy Owens, Ross Brooks, William Taylor.

Upon their arrival on the scene at the early Sunday morning hour, the officers found the seven negroes engaged in a big crap game in one of the large rooms in the row and the gambling was on in earnest. The officers rounded up every negro present and brought them to the police station where they will remain until their preliminary hearing.

The arrests are the result of an attempt of Marshal Kesseling to enforce the new gambling laws as he had previously given notice that all forms of gambling must stop. It was also the result of a little sleuthing on the part of one of the officers and when everything was in readiness the negroes made no resistance in the face of the three officers and were brought to the station without much trouble. It is thought by the officers that the game was a bigger one earlier in the evening.

Reports from the "Red Light" district are to the effect that the residents thereof have taken heed to the warning of Marshal Kesseling and have fortified themselves against any action of the law as authorized in recent Iowa legislation. Many landlords of these houses of ill-fame are still living as peaceful citizens but they have disposed of the small army of young women, who have shaken the dust of Keokuk from their heels. At the present time everything is peaceful and quietude reigns in the lower districts and conditions will continue to be such for a time at least. Several of the landlords are known to have closed up their houses and left the city.

A representative of the Keokuk Electric Light and Power company made a tour the other day for the purpose of finding out whether the landlords wanted their gas or electric light meters removed in case they were about to leave the city. He found that only one had closed up and wanted the meter removed, the others requesting that the meters be left intact. This leads to the belief that while the "Red Light" will be closed for a time the young women will flock back to the city.

POLICE NEWS

Dennis Harrington, an old and often time drunk, was taken to the city jail early Sunday morning in an intoxicated condition by Officer Scheevers on complaint of his wife.

Claud Clark, a drunk, was arrested by Officer Freeman Saturday evening at 11 o'clock.

With the arrests Saturday and Sunday evening the city jail has many occupants and is once more crowded again.

Judge McNamara took a day off today and there was no session of the superior court.


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


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GOLD MEDAL FLOUR


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
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
