

FORMER RESIDENT OF THIS CITY

T. L. Hites Was at One Time a Well Known Citizen and Superintendent of Canning Factory

HE DIED IN VIRGINIA

Was a Prominent Church Worker and Enthusiastic Member of the Young Men's Christian Association.

A former resident of Keokuk, T. L. Hites, died this month in Virginia of typhoid fever.

He will be well remembered by many Keokuk friends, for he resided here for a number of years, being at one time the superintendent of the Keokuk Canning Co.

His death is noted in the News of Shreve, Ohio, as follows: T. L. Hites was born in Marion county, Iowa, April 10, 1861, and died of typhoid fever in Spencer, West Virginia, July 7, 1909.

He was a man admired by young and old and loved by the children. He made trips wherever he went and left the place better for having lived in it.

The funeral service was in the Mrs. Ida Lewis home at 2 o'clock Saturday conducted by Rev. L. T. Wines, assisted by Rev. Ed. F. Wood.
