

DEATH FROM DREAD LOCK JAW

Donald, the Little Eight Year Old Son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Whitney Died at Hospital

SUFFERED AWFUL AGONY

Death Came as a Relief After Much Suffering to the Little Fellow Who Died Yesterday.

The first case of lock jaw reported in this vicinity in some time and death resulting from that dread affection, is the death of little Donald Whitney, the eight year old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Whitney, residents of Vincennes, Iowa, and well known in this city.

The little fellow stepped on a nail at his home last Tuesday, the nail being rusty, blood poisoning set in shortly after which resulted in lock jaw causing the death of the boy.

Much suffering was caused the little fellow and late Saturday at midnight he was brought to this city by his father and taken to St. Joseph's hospital, dying yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Everything possible was done by the attending physicians to relieve the pain of the patient little sufferer who passed through much agony on Saturday and death came as a welcome relief.

The family which is a respected one of Vincennes is much broken up over the death of the son and have the sympathy of the entire community in the loss of the little fellow.

The body was prepared today for burial and will be removed today to the home at Vincennes where interment will be made tomorrow afternoon.

INCREASED FARES ON C. B. & Q.

Fare to St. Louis and Other Missouri Points Increased After the Fifteenth of August

SECTION MEN WANTED

Railroads are Experiencing a Hard Time in Getting Section Hands and Gang Laborers.

The C. B. & Q. ticket offices of this city have received a new tariff stating that the fares between Keokuk and certain Missouri points have been increased, a basis of 2 1/2c per mile being used. This new tariff is effective August 15. An example of the increase in the passenger rates, for illustration, the fare between Keokuk and St. Louis at the present time is \$3.60, by the new tariff \$4.45 after August 15. The fare between Keokuk and Kansas City by way of the Q at the present time is \$5.25 and by the new tariff, \$6.20. A number of Missouri points are not included in the new tariff but will no doubt be announced soon, it is thought.

SECTION MEN SCARCE

Section men seem to be very scarce at the present time and all railroads are having their troubles in getting enough of this class of laboring men to do the vast amount of improvement work that is being done at the present time by many of the roads.

The following notice was received by the local C. B. & Q. agent at Keokuk today from Superintendent A. N. Willis of the Hannibal division:

"We are in need of section men and extra gang laborers at different points along the line. Section men are now receiving 14 1/2 cents per hour and extra gang laborers 14 cents per hour. Inasmuch as the harvest is about over it seems we should be able to pick up a sufficient number of men to fill out the gangs. We'd you would see if you could not round up a few men at your station. If you can round up any men, wire me and I will arrange for movement to points where they are needed. Would appreciate your earnest efforts in this direction."
