—Nine hundred embalmers have sent in their renewals to Dr. L. A. Thomas of the state board of health, according to law. This is unprecedented in the history of the office. The law requires that all embalmers forward their \$1 renewal fee to the secretary of the board of health before August 1. Last Saturday afternoon Dr. Thomas sent out postal cards to 100 delinquents and practically the entire number responded. The first few days of this month Dr. Thomas' office was fairly swamped with the application for renewal owing to the fact that last year the law was enforced and several embalmers compelled to take the examinations again in order to obtain a certificate. "All embalmers who do not get their renewals before August 1 will have to take the annual examinations to secure a certificate," said Dr. Thomas.

There are a number of mail trains into Keokuk each day and the services of a clerk at the depot are required. Provisions will be made for a mail room at the depot. It is quite a boost for Keokuk and helps the lines running into that place immensely.

—Wm. Resch and R. J. Stevens of Woodland were in Palmyra yesterday in search of some dynamite with which to blow up a wolf den, says the Pamyra Spectator. Monday, while Mr. Stevens was riding through his woodland pasture, a big gray wolf bounded from a pile of brush in front of him. He quickly rode back to his house, called his dogs and in company with W. F. Howell, started in pursuit of the wolf. They not only discovered the old wolf but three young ones and ran them into a cave. This morning they have arranged for a big wolf hunt, expecting to drive the animals into their hole and then blow them up with dynamite. These are the first wolves that have been seen in this section for several years. A number of Angora goats have recently been killed on Mr. Howell's and Mr. Stevens' farms, but it was not charged up to the wolves until now. They have captured one wolf alive. They will continue the chase and capture as many as possible, and then dynamite the den.
