Allowed Pathfinders but six hits in Opening Battle and Annis Assisted With Timely Single.

BURLINGTON, Iowa, August 25.—'Pa' Belt broke his double-header hoodoo yesterday by winning the first game of the double session with Wee Willie Prough on the slab, by a score of 1 to 0. The second spasm, which by agreement only went seven frames, was the Pathfinders at all stages of the game, although both big 'Rube' Burch and Hendricks were touched up for nine singles. Wagner was on the mound in the first game for the locals and he and Prough engaged in a pretty little pitcher's battle in which the honors were about evenly divided, Prough granting six hits, fanning seven and walking three while Hans gave four bingles, whiffed two and passed three, the one score off of Wagner coming on a base on balls, an alleged balk and a bingle. The fielding characterized the work of both teams, the Pathfinders having one boot and the Indians two in the two games. Manusch and Finney covered themselves with glory by their fast work in covering the ground and pulling down flies that looked good for two bags at least.

The Indians lonely tally came in the 8th, Landry walking and then going to second on what Gleason averred was a balk on the part of Hans. Annis singled to center scoring Landry.

The second spasm by agreement only went seven innings, leaving the score 5 to 2 in favor of the locals.

Severoid, while he does not encourage his pitchers as Lemon does, is catching in fine style and pegging well, while he can handle the willow with any one on the team. Chief Hiltz escorted a gentleman who had imbibed a little too freely from the grand stand yesterday and started him down town. The youth was getting in his best rooting for Keokuk, but he didn't seem to make a hit even there as the Keokuk players disowned him as one of their fans, and did their best to silence him. The fellow besides being extremely noisy was using bad language a little too freely. Chief Hiltz, who was in plain clothes, warned him to keep still and when the misguided youth shot off his mouth in return, was quickly bundled from the grounds.

LEADERS PLAY WEAKER TEAMS

Indians are Only Players Away from Home During the Next Series and Will Play Jacksonville.

ALL THREE ARE NEEDED

No Chance to Get Points Back Unless Clean Sweep is Made During Next Series—A Line On Dope.

Keokuk will be the only team of the three leaders not at home during the series opening tomorrow, but even at that good ball playing should enable the Indians to pull through an easy series. Keokuk goes to Jacksonville, while Burlington is home with Ottumwa. Kewanee is home with Waterloo and Hannibal, is home with Quincy. Thus as can be seen the four leaders are opposing the second division teams and must win or hit the bumps.

It is hard to figure out how Keokuk will get many games back on the present trip, for Burlington, Kewanee and Hannibal should win two out of three of their games. If the Indians capture three straights they will just about gain one game on the other three clubs, as Ottumwa and Quincy should win at least one and Waterloo might pull two. The Indians should pull a large crowd in the Jacksonville series as the people of that city turn out to see 'Pa' Belt, a former citizen. Not only that but the Indians strike a boosters' day and a Sunday with a Saturday sandwiched in between the two days. Preparations have been made by the Jacksonville directors to make Friday boosters day and the day is expected to be a big one. Saturday is always a fair day in Jacksonville during the baseball season and Sunday will be another big day. It is expected that 2,500 will attend the three games in Jacksonville during the next three days.

The present series at Burlington has been rather clearstros, for up to date the Indians have won but one out of four. Keokuk has defeated Burlington on the home grounds, but when at Burlington has suffered defeats quite regularly.

Decatur Review: 'Word comes from Bloomington that Manager Broberg of the Cedar Rapids team, has offered to sell his franchise in the Three-Eye league to Danville for \$2,000. Broberg said his terms were that Danville build a new park and retain him as manager at a fat salary. It is understood that President Sexton would oppose this sale as Danville is too far out of the way and the mileage would become too large. It is understood that Hannibal and Quincy will succeed Cedar Rapids and Dubuque next year.' President Broberg, although he owns the Cedar Rapids franchise, cannot sell it to another city. Cedar Rapids is Three-Eye property and as long as Cedar Rapids furnishes the required 30,000 attendance, not alone the league, but Cedar Rapids as well has to be considered. If either refuses to give its consent, the deal falls through. As far as Quincy and Hannibal are concerned, the wish is the father of the thought. The Three-Eye would like to have Quincy, but unless the Three-Eye wants Quincy badly and the Central Association agrees to let Quincy go, or the Three-Eye thinks it worth \$2,500 as draft price, Quincy will have to remain in the Central. The only way out of it would be a re-districting of the leagues and it is doubtful whether the national commission would do this as it would undoubtedly cause an awful lot of dissatisfaction among smaller leagues which would lose some of their best cities. The Central without Quincy and Hannibal might blow up before the first of July.

The Pathfinders are thirty points to the good. They have won one more game and lost five less. The pennant is yet a possibility and by boosting the team Keokuk may yet be able to cop the flag.

In the first game yesterday we played errorless ball; in the second battle we made two mistakes. A single game today for Keokuk would help a little, as the Indians may make a clean sweep at Jacksonville.

Waterloo defeated Jacksonville 2 to 1 yesterday. The Lunatics should be able to tomorrow for the Indians or we miss our guess.

The Indians are certainly hitting the tough luck. Just think of going all season with scarcely a mishap and then have the injuries fall thick and fast. It has been predicted that Egan will be in second place or worse by September 12. He has offered every player on the team a suit of clothes if the Pathfinders are in first place on that date.
