

ROUGH ROAD FOR CANNON

The Iron Duke of American Politics is Going to Have Trouble During the Coming Session of Congress.

FOWLER STARTED IN

He Made the Preliminary Defeat of Those Who Will Try and Accomplish the Downfall of Uncle Joe.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 1.—"Uncle Joe" Cannon, the "Iron Duke of American Politics," is going to have a rough road to travel during the coming session of congress.

That is the opinion of members here who are following the situation closely. The throwing of the gauntlet by Representative Fowler of New Jersey, and his drastic arraignment of the speaker and his "machine" in the house, is but the preliminary deft of those who are busily engaged in laying plans to encompass the downfall of the Danville statesman and the policies for which he stands.

The so-called insurgents made a vigorous but ineffectual fight against "Cannonism" at the last session. They lost, but it is extremely doubtful whether the speaker really "got even" with these reformers by giving them the poorest committee assignments in his power. The insurgents themselves are rather pleased that the speaker treated them in this way—it gives them more ammunition for the next battle, and it only strengthens their contention that the greatest of all evils in the present government of the house is the speaker's power of suppressing men on committees, or in "packing" the committees so that they will be pliant to his will.

Then too, Speaker Cannon's reputation wasn't enhanced particularly by the course he adopted during the tariff session. He was allied with the high duty advocates. It was "Uncle Joe" who led the fight for a duty on oil, it was "Uncle Joe" who strenuously worked for increased rates on gloves and hosiery; it was "Uncle Joe" who later was found working—quietly but vigorously—against President Taft in his efforts to secure reductions. Such members are now wondering whether, if the rules actually had been revised on March 15, there would not have been a "real downward tariff revision" when the Payne bill was acted upon. The chances are that during the next session every bit of legislation promoted by Speaker Cannon will be thoroughly scrutinized for possible "jokers."

The president has already announced that he will ask congress next session to enact new railroad legislation. He favors progressive laws, which will give the government greater regulative power over railway operations. So far, Speaker Cannon has stood sharply against such legislation, and he is hostile to any attempt further to increase the government's supervisory power over corporations.

It has more than once been whispered that the president has small sympathy with the One-Minute House of representatives. He doesn't like "Czars" and "Iron Dukes." He wants a really representative house of representatives, and it would not be at all a surprise to members to see the guns of the administration leveled against Cannonism at the next session.

Meanwhile the insurgents are busy on the chautauquas and lyceum circuits thundering denunciations of the speaker. No one has yet had the

NEW SPECIMENS IN THE RIVER

Great Lake Fish Have Appeared in the Des Moines River for the First Time.

Two new species of fish have just been discovered in the Des Moines river, which have not heretofore been seen in Iowa waters.

The are Lake Michigan fish and the only way in which one can account for their being in the Des Moines river where they were caught by fishermen, is that they escaped down the Illinois river through the Chicago river which was dredged out so that it ran backward and drained the lake into the Illinois river.

The fact that these lake fish are coming down into the rivers which never knew them before is raising a large question with fishermen as to what it will eventually amount to. Will the Lake Michigan fish drive out the native fish or will the rivers and streams of Iowa and other states be

thus replenished with good fish so that the fishermen will have a new paradise in which to live—and fish.

The two kinds thus far discovered are not good for food. One is the aplodinotus grunniens rafinesque commonly known as the fresh-water drum or thunder pumper. The other is the hidontergius le seuter, commonly known as moon-eye or toothed herring. The specimen received of the first was a four pounder but they reach as high as fifty and sixty pounds. The other is about twelve inches long. The moon-eye is a pretty fish with shining silvery scales and blood red fins and tail with marginal white.

Since neither of these fish are of any account for food and will merely eat the food of the other fish and possibly eat the other fish as well, fishermen can see no particular good to be had from the Lake Michigan fish thus far. The two specimens are common in the rivers that drain into the Great Lakes but are not common to the Mississippi valley.

KIRKSVILLE GAINS BY BEING DRY

No Calamity Resulted From the Closing of the Saloons as Was Predicted by Some.

A Kirksville newspaper says: Kirksville closed its twelfth month of temperance yesterday. The last saloon in town closed its doors a year ago. The calamity that was predicted during a very warm local option fight in the city and in Adair county failed to arrive. In fact the twelve months of drought has been a period of unprecedented growth. Butcher shops and bakeries took possession of the buildings made vacant by the local option law and the owners did not lose a month's rent.

The merchants of Kirksville say that their business has been from 25 to 50 per cent larger during the twelve months just closing than it was a year ago. More than \$200,000 worth of business houses and residences are being built this season and there is not a vacant house in the town. Four large business buildings are now being erected near the public square to satisfy the demands for the increasing number of stores. Property values and rents are steadily increasing and the people are engaged in getting up a bonus of \$100,000 for an interurban railroad to Hannibal.

Only one business in Kirksville and Adair county has suffered. That is the criminal court. The business of this institution has decreased 50 per cent. The officers now keep busy by making the people cut their weeds and obey the sanitary ordinances of the city. There has not been a murder case in the courts for a year and the county jail has only two occupants.
