

CANTONIA HAS BEEN RAISED

Government Dredge Boat Aetna Was Brought Into Play Saturday and Did the Work Successfully.

IN DRY DOCKS NOW

Government Inspectors Will Arrive Today From St. Louis and inspect the Hull of the Damaged Craft.

After lying in the bottom of the Mississippi at Canton for the past five or six weeks, the ferry boat Cantonia was finally brought to the surface with the aid of the government dredge boat Aetna which has been working in the canal during the past season and which only assisted the stricken ferry by special request of the owners who had become discouraged by the repeated failures of other outfits to bring the craft to the surface. The work of pumping the water from the boat was, however, not without incident.

Unsuccessful at First.

The dredge was towed to the scene from this place Saturday afternoon and upon arrival immediately got to work. As soon as everything was adjusted the pump was started and in three minutes the boat was dry and floating. It seems though, that the work was being done too fast as before they could get a siphon started she had sunk again, having filled with water so fast. Five times this was repeated with the same results and then Major Meigs, who was in charge of the work, hit upon a scheme for choking the discharge and thereby causing a slower flow of water. Working this way the boat was kept on top and a siphon put in place. As soon as possible steam was gotten up and things put in place.

In Dry Docks.

The Cantonia presented a very interesting appearance when she reached the surface and was much the worse for her visit with the fish. The cause of her submerging was simply a general leakage, the hull seeming to be in bad shape. Yesterday afternoon she was brought up the river under her own steam and will be taken to the dry docks this afternoon where necessary repairs will be made. Government Boat Inspector Gordon of St. Louis is expected here today or tomorrow to look the craft over. The Aetna resumed her work in the canal again immediately upon her return.

RACE OF CORN AND JACK FROST

It is Now On and Will Not Be Decided Until Some Time Early Next Month.

The great annual race between King Corn and Jack Frost is on. It commenced on the morning of September 2, when some of the tender garden truck in the extreme northern part of the state was nipped. It will continue until the corn is thoroughly matured or until a heavy frost occurs which would put an end to the race right there and then.

It is a race for life and death on the part of King Corn, and with the aid of Old Sol he may be able to get over the line in advance of his deadly opponent. Up to the present time he has received little aid by the warm rays of the latter so is badly in need of a few hot days from now until the climate is reached, which will be some time during the first or second week in October for Jack Frost is always on hand by that time. Sometimes he has come earlier and sometimes later and for the benefit of the corn growers the following figures are published, showing the record of the first killing frost for the past nine years: 1900—Oct. 8. Temperature 33 degrees 1901—Oct. 4. Temperature 30 degrees 1902—Oct. 14. Temperature 31 degrees 1903—Oct. 18. Temperature 31 degrees 1904—Oct. 23. Temperature 29 degrees 1905—Oct. 12. Temperature 30 degrees 1906—Oct. 12. Temperature 27 degrees 1907—Sept. 28. Temperature 33 degrees
