### EARTH TREMBLED FOR A SHORT TIME

A Distinct Earthquake Shock Was Felt This Morning by a Large Number of Keokuk People.

### GOOD SOUND SHAKING

Windows and Doors Rattled and Some Were Unaware of the Fact That an Earthquake Was Taking Place.

Did you feel the earthquake this morning? There was one and a very distinct shock was felt by a large number of citizens who were rudely awakened from their sound slumbers about a quarter of four by the rattling of the windows and the shaking of the doors. Beds shook and for about the space of ten seconds there was a distinct shock felt in all parts of the city. Many people felt the shock and were speaking of it today, although there were any number of sound slumbers who were unaware that anything out of the ordinary was taking place.

This is the third or fourth distinct shock felt from earthquake that has been felt in Keokuk in the last six months but those who felt this morning's quake state that it was of longer duration than those preceding it though only one shock was felt, this morning.

Accompanying the shock a sound very like that of a strong wind blowing could be heard and several who heard it say that they jumped from their beds to see what was going on and became aware of the quake by the shaking of the floors in the house, with the trembling sensation that accompanies these earth phenomena.

Telegraph reports state today that Keokuk was not only the only place where the shock was felt, a number of nearby towns and cities feeling the earth tremble at the same time and with the same force.

These quakes have become more frequent in the past several years and are becoming more so, the shock felt this morning being the third or fourth one that has occurred in the past few months. Though there is nothing to be feared from these earth tremblings, the feeling is not a pleasant one and that ghostly feeling accompanies each in turn that awakes citizens from their sleep.


