Will Remain Here Until Affairs Are Settled—Rev. H. P. Jones is the Pastor For Local Church.

Rev. W. A. Searcy of the Bethel A. M. E. church has returned from the conference at Moline where he was assigned to a new pastorate in Monmouth. Rev. H. P. Jones of Milwaukee will fill in here, he also having been appointed at the late meeting in Moline. Rev. Searcy returned home last night having been attending the conference, he having been a member of the committees of "state of the church," and also of "third year study." Although he will immediately take up his work in his new location he will not take his family with him until all his business affairs are settled, but will go back and forth until that time.

Rev. Jones is in town today looking up his prospects but will probably not take charge of the services the coming Sunday as he expects to leave again tomorrow in order to look after business affairs, in the meantime will see that a supply minister is on hand.

Chinese Floating Hotel.
A floating hotel is to be established in China. The vessel will have three decks, the lower being arranged for dining, billiard, smoking and card rooms. The main deck will contain a drawing room and 24 bedrooms, each with a full-sized bath and dressing room, while the upperdeck, or spar deck, has been arranged as a promenade.

**DREDGING BELOW
LOWER LOCK**

The Etna is at Work Removing a Sand Bar Which Has Been Interfering With Traffic.

COL. RICHE WAS HERE

Steamer Dubuque Makes Last Trip to Burlington Tonight—Wenona Will Not Discontinue Seventh Day Runs.

The government dredge boat Etna started working in the canal this morning just beyond the lower lock, where during the past summer a bar has formed which hinders traffic to some extent, and which has been enlarging in dangerous proportions lately. The sand is being thrown over the boom into the river as it is pumped out of the canal. It is expected that the work will be finished shortly.
Major C. S. Riche, U. S. C. E. of Rock Island, was in the city yesterday. While here he made an inspection of work being done along the canal, before proceeding to St. Louis where he has further business.

The Diamond Jo boat Dubuque, the only large steamer now in the trade on local waters, will make its last trip past Keokuk on to Burlington tonight. After this for the rest of the season she will simply come as far as the local port and then return. With the new route the boat will leave its southern terminal, St. Louis, Wednesday instead of Tuesday.

Since the announcement that the steamer Keokuk would discontinue her Sunday trips, patrons of the Wenona, the other charge of the Carnival Packet company running between here and Burlington, have been wondering if she also would be taken out of the Sabbath trade for the remainder of the season. However, Captain Dodds of that steamer has notified the local agents that he will continue to run the little craft as long as there is anything doing, which will probably be for some time, judging from the way people are inquiring about it.


